GOVERNOR HODGES DEDICATES WEEK FOR HONORING N. C.'S AGING CITIZENS

Governor Hodges' official statement dedicating the week of July 13-19 as a week in which to honor North Carolina's aging citizens finds both interest and varied activity in Yancey County, according to a statement by L. G. Deyton, county superintendent of public welfare.

There are a total of 400 persons 65 or older who are receiving old age assistance through the county welfare department, L. G. Deyton said. These persons have been found to be in need according to a uniform budget used state-wide. The average monthly grant given to these persons is \$30.73.

In addition to money grants, various non-financial casework services are available for older people and others through the county department of public welfare. These casework services are available to people in all walks of life no matter what their economic level may be.

A total of 81 non-financial services were given to approximately 81 persons during the month of June by the staff of the county welfare department.

One of the specialized services provided through the county welfare department and the State Board of Public Welfare is counsel as to suitable licensed boarding homes for the aged. There are now over 350 licensed homes in 83 counties. In Yancey County there are 2 licensed boarding

There are approximately 1,000 textile plants now in operation in North Carolina.

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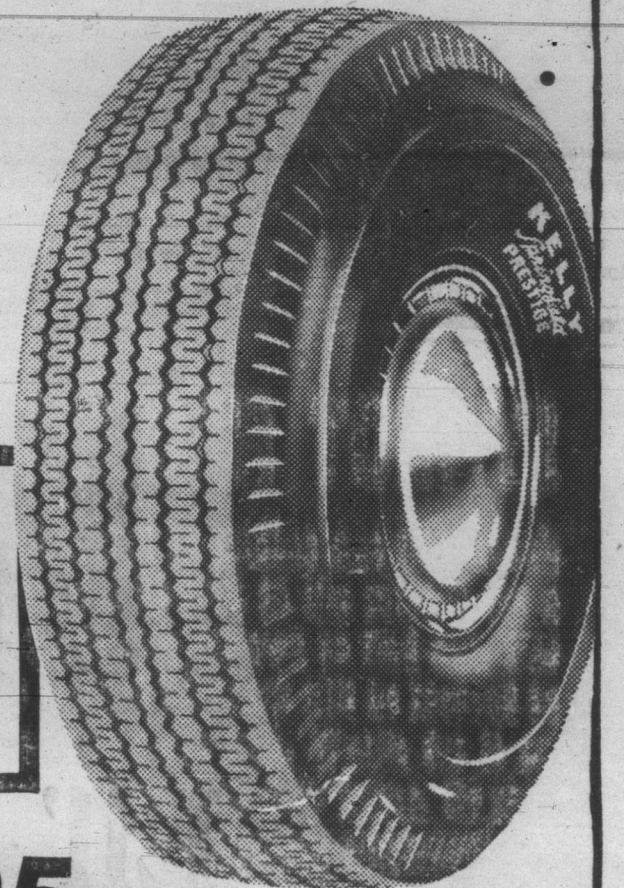
