have one. I put in a little of this and that but it comes out so good that several people like it very much. To try it use unbaked pie shells. For the filling use a quart of pumpkin, measured after it has been cooked and mashed. Add 3 egg yolks—more eggs will make it better—2 cups brown sugar, 4 tbs. flour—use less flour if you use more eggs—and the following seasonings: 2 tsp. salt, 1-8 tsp. pepper, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 2 tsp. nutmeg, 1-4 tsp. cloves and 1-4 tsp. ginger. Mix thoroughly, add about 1 qt. milk. It is better if you use some cream. Many times I use the powdered non-fat milk and then add 1 cup cream. Mix—Beat the egg whites until almost stiff, add to pumpkin mixture and mix. Pour into 3 unbaked pie shells and bake in 350 to 400 degree oven for 45 to 60 minutes. If this recipe is as clear as mud to you, just remember I had to get it that way from my mother and change it to suit myself, and my daughters will have to get it that way from me. I find I can change this recipe according to my budget, too.

**OVER \$2,000,000 RAISED BY WNC METHODISTS**

Local Methodists were notified today by Bishop Nolan B. Harmon of Charlotte that \$2,255,000 has already been pledged by the 1,100 churches of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church in their campaign for Christian higher education.

The remainder of the \$3,000,000 goal is expected to be pledged by Sunday (November 23), which has been designated as Thanksgiving Sunday.

Sharing in these capital funds will be Brevard College, Greensboro College, High Point College, Duke Divinity School, and the Wesley Foundations of the University of North Carolina, Western Carolina College and Appalachian State Teachers College.

In a message to Methodists of Buncombe, Henderson, Transylvania, Polk, Madison, and Yancey Counties, Bishop Harmon said, "This Campaign can produce a glorious victory as every church in the Western North Carolina Conference accepts its share in the great effort. Continued prayers; generous pledging; and ear-

nest, consecrated work by our Methodists will bring us victory."
