The murder charge In the death of his wife, Mrs. Ethel Robinson, 32, was dismissed by the judge because state's evidence showed that her death was accidental. Robinson had not pleaded guilty to this charge.

Testimony showed that Mrs. Robinson ran between her husband and Turner and grabbed the shotgun from her husband after he told Turner to leave his home and Turner refused. The gun accidently discharged and struck her. Turner was killed about two miles away un Cattail Creek Road

The shootings occurred shortly after. Mrs. Robinson arrived home from Swannanoa, where she was working, with Turner in his car. Robinson had been charged with two counts of first degree murder but had been free on \$10,000 bond.


