

Rep. Taylor Invites Applications For Spots In Service Academies

Potential applicants for appointment to any of the four U. S. military academies for the 1964 term have been invited by the 11th District Congressman Roy A. Taylor to take a special Civil Service Commission examination to be given July 8 in Asheville.

Representative Taylor said the test will be given on that date for young men who wish to be designated by a member of Congress for appointment to the U. S. Air Force Academy, the U. S.

Merchant Marine Academy, the U. S. Army Military Academy and the U. S. Naval Academy.

The purpose of the examination Rep. Taylor said, is to provide an objective testing method which will aid him in the selection of appointees to the four academies.

Taylor said he would be furnished results of the examination about August 8, and would be able to use these results in making selections for appointees to the classes of 1964 in the academies.

The Congressman emphasized that appointments for the 1963 classes, starting in July, were closed several weeks ago and that files are now being set up for 1964 applicants.

"The July test could be of invaluable assistance to me in helping determine the best qualified applicants for the 1964 classes," Taylor said. He urged all those interested in being considered for appointment to any of the four military academies should make arrangements for this examination prior to June 1, through his District Secretary, Tom L. 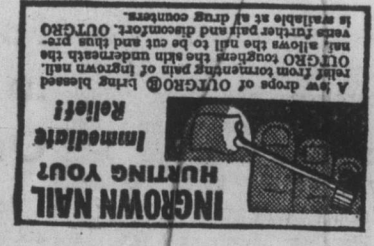

Yancey's Social Security Payoff New Totals \$66,550 Per Month

Monthly old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits in Yancey County now top \$66,556. Henry Horrocks, social security representative, said this week.

The new monthly figure represents an overall increase of 10 percent over the corresponding last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as the growth of our aged population," Horrocks said. "This money stimulates county business, as most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter."

There is no longer any doubt, he said, that social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in Yancey County.

Monthly benefits first became payable in January, 1940, and they have continued without interruption for 23 years, accompanied by a steady growth in the number of beneficiaries.

Horrocks noted that as of December 31, 1962, some 1,608 people in Yancey

County were collecting \$798,672 annually from social security.

Many additional people in Yancey County could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the social security law. That is the reason they are urged to secure an appointment with the social security representative, who visits Yancey County regularly whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

Nationally more than 18 million beneficiaries are receiving payments in excess of 1.2 billion dollars per month.

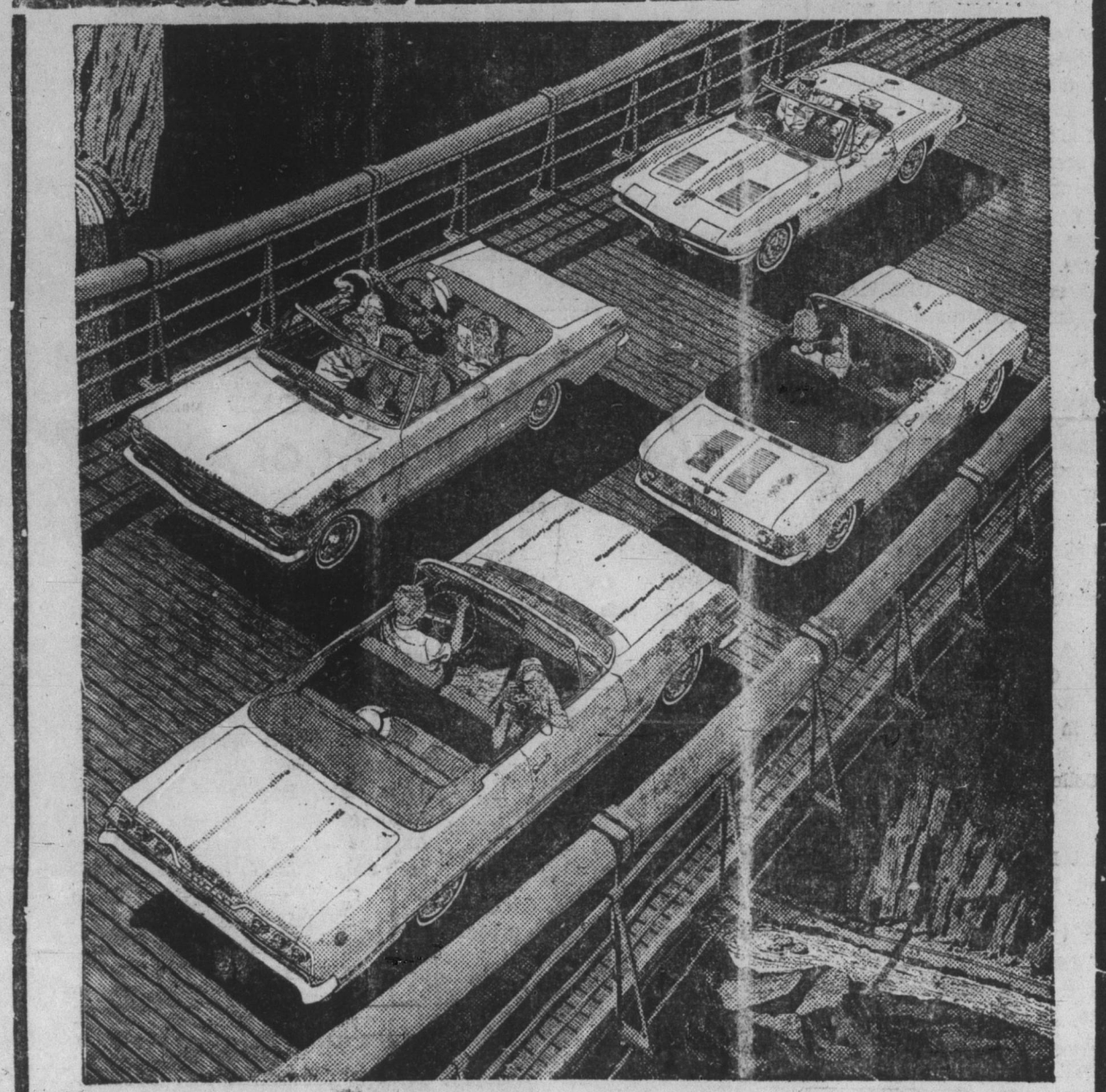
