Plan ACP Spring Practices Now

practices to be established on their farms with Agricultural Conservation Program cooperation next spring and summer should file their requests for program assistance as soon as possible. J.

T. Randolph, Office Manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and suggested. The 1964 ACP was drawn up several months ago, and applications are being accepted at the ASCS county office.

Randolph explained that the sooner the application is filed, the easier it will be to obtain approval of the practice and take care now is approxmately 57, million of other program details before the work is begun.

Under the 1964 program, costshare program assistance averages about half the cost of carrying out such conservation practices as establishing and improving vegetative cover of grasses, legumes, or trees for soil protection; installing erosion-control structures; and practices for the conservation or more efficient use

The Agricultural Consertation Program has been in continuous operation since 1936, when it was authorized by national legislation to encourage farmers to protect soil, water, and woodland resources on the farm of the Nation by sharing the costs of needed conservation measures.

"ACP program assistance has been singularly effective in introducing conservation practices on privately-owned cropland, pasture, or woodland," Mr. Randolph said, 'and this applies particularly to practices which provide little or no immediate return."

The initial sign-up period will be from January 20, 1963 through February 10, 1964.
