Dean Perry is now in Brasilia. He is one of an investigating team looking at teacher education programs in schools equivalent to American high schools and elementary schools.

It is a part of the Alliance for Progress Program between the United States and South American countries.

"Little Lambs"
"My little lamb" are the words a mother uses to speak of her baby.

The similarity between human babies and baby sheep furnishes the basis for medical research at the University of North Carolina.

Sheep are selected here, in prenatal studies, according to Dr. Stark Wolkoff, because of certain likenesses in size and other aspects.

A lamb weighs between eight and 10 pounds at birth, about the same as a human baby.

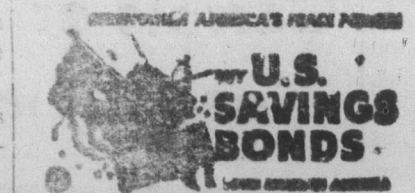
The size of a lamb also makes surgery possible, and blood samples can be obtained.

Pre-birth findings are gathered in relation to blood pressure, heart rate, and other physiologic reactions.

The "Brattain Rock"
Because a boy thought twice about throwing a rock away, it is known that life existed in Stanley County, North Carolina, fifty years longer than had heretofore been expected.

To most boys, finding a loose rock and picking it up and throwing it at a convenient target comes as natural as falling off a log.

But a 14-year-old Stanley County boy who likes his school work in "earth sciences" stopped short of tossing a rock when he noticed something unusual about it. John Brattain of West Stanley High School, near Albemarle, is



an admitted rock hound.

His eye caught the markings on the rock he was about to throw. He halted. He took the rock home. After a time, he sent the specimen to Chapel Hill.

In the University, Professor Joseph St. Jean of the Geology Department, an authority on fossils, became excited. He showed the rock to Prof. Roy Ingram chairman of the Geology Department.

The rock John Brattain found was 500 million years old.

The fossil remains belong to the Cambrian Age, which began 500,000,000 years ago. Before young Brattain's find, it had been thought that Piedmont Rock belonged to the Ordovician Age, about 450 million years ago.

The fossil on the "Brattain Rock" is a trilobite. A trilobite is an ancient marine animal.

To test the authenticity of the find, the two geologists visited John Brattain, and he showed them where he found the rock. Although they found no other fossils, they did establish the fact that the "Brattain Rock" is native to that area, and that the trilobite did indeed live in what is now Stanley County 500 million years ago.
