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Registration At East Yancey Begins April 30

Registration at East Yancey High School for 1964-65 will begin Thursday, April 30. Registration information will be issued to students Thursday, April 30 by the Home Room teachers. Parents are urged to meet with the faculty Monday, May 4 at 7:30 p. m.

The registration sheets should be returned to the home rooms not earlier than Tuesday, May 6 nor later than Wednesday, May 7.

At least eighteen standard units are required for graduation. A unit is the credit allowed for the satisfactory completion of a course pursued for thirty-six weeks or more per year with five class periods per week.

Under the twelve-year public school program, the requirements

for graduation are English, 4 units; Mathematics, 2 units; Social Studies, 3 units; Science 2 units; Physical Education, 1 unit; and Electives, 6 units; making a total of 18 units.

English is required in each year of high school; mathematics is required in the 9th and 10th grades; social studies is required in the 10th year (World History) and the 11th year (American History) and one additional unit. Science is required in the 9th year (General Science) and 10th year, Biology; physical education is required in the 9th year.

Ninth grade requirements are: English I, Science I, Math I, Physical Education I. Electives are: Citizenship, Home Economics I and Agriculture.

Tenth Grade requirements are: English II, Biology, Math (Algebra I or II), World History. Electives are: Ph-Ed II (1/2 unit), Home Ec. II, General Business, Business Math, Agriculture I or II, French I.

Eleventh Grade requirements: English III, American History, Electives: Home Ec. III, Typing I, World Geography, Math. III, (Geom), Shorthand I, Chemistry, Physics, Dramatics, French I, Secretarial Practice, Ph. Ed. II (1/2 unit).

Twelfth Year requirements: English IV, Electives: Sociology, Typing II, French II, Geometry, Chemistry, Physics, Home Ec. IV, Agriculture IV, Bookkeeping, Secretarial Practice, Shorthand II, Ph. Ed. II (1/2 unit), Dramatics.

Week Of May 3-9 Special Week On Aging

RALEIGH, N. C.—Governor Terry Sanford has designated the week of May 3-9, 1964, as the Special Week on Aging. The Special Week, sponsored by the Governor's Coordinating Committee on Aging, is set aside each year to honor the aging within the State. The date coincides with the national observance of the Month of May to honor citizens who are 65 years of age or older.

Needs and opportunities for North Carolina's approximately 344,000 citizens who have reached the age of 65 will be highlighted during this week.

County committees will sponsor events and homes for the aged will hold open house. This week will stress further study of the needs of these older citizens and the provision of more opportunities for community service, for suitable living arrangements, for employment opportunities, for recreational activities, for Social Security and other benefits for the aged citizens.

In addition to the statement by Governor Sanford, mayors will issue similar proclamations in recognition of the Special Week.

Mrs. Arthelia Brooks, Yancey County Chairman is on the Governor's Coordinating Committee for the aging.

Mrs. Brooks would like to hear from some of the older citizens of the county. Two of the oldest known citizens passed away last year. Older citizens are asked to contact Mrs. Brooks or The Yancey Record. We are anxious to know some of the older people in our county.

The club has as its chief project for the year, the restoration of the missing parts stolen by vandals years ago, not, we are glad to say, by persons living here but from another state. Second Dose Of Polio Vaccine To Be Given On May 10

A second dose of the oral polio vaccine will be offered to residents of Yancey County on Sunday afternoon, May tenth. This feeding will be a follow-up to the administration of the first dose of the Sabin vaccine given during the first part of March. At that time, a total of 9,300

persons in the county took the vaccine, given on a lump of sugar. The second, or "booster," dose is recommended by doctors to provide more complete immunity. As was done in the first feeding, a donation of fifty cents will be asked to cover the cost of the vaccine.

The five feeding stations in Yancey County will be open from 1:00 p. m. until 5:00 p. m. Feeding lines will again be run at Bee Log School, Cane River High School, Clearmont School, East Yancey High School, and South Toe River School. Each person who expects to get his second dose of the vaccine is asked to bring the small record card of his first vaccination.

A novel feature of the second go-round is that the vaccine will also be offered to persons who missed taking the first dose in March. This new group, in turn, will be able to get its second dose during a third feeding, to be given three months later at the Yancey County Health Department.

Dr. Garland Wampler, Chairman of this massive, county-wide immunization drive, warned against a let down on the second effort. "It will be important," said Dr. Wampler, "that everyone take his second dose of the polio vaccine to obtain maximum protection against this crippling disease."

Organ Placed In Chape! As Memorial For Jane Bellack Wray

An electronic organ has been purchased for the chapel of Milwaukee-Downer Seminary in Milwaukee, Wisconsin as a memorial for Jane Bellack Wray. College Chorus And Touring Choir To Perform "A German Requiem"

MARS HILL—The combined voices of the Mars Hill College Chorus and the touring choir will perform "A German Requiem" by Brahms in Moore Auditorium here at 3 p. m. Sunday (May 3).

Robert C. Rich, director of the two choral groups which comprise 110 students, said visitors will be welcomed and there will be no admission fee.

Soloists will be Mrs. Lee Hancy Packer of Asheville, soprano, and Douglas Therrell of the college music faculty, baritone. Mrs. Donna Robertson, also of the music faculty, will accompany on the college's \$100,000 four-manual pipe organ.

Although not a liturgical mass, the work does take its text from passages of both the Old and New Testaments which are frequently used in Anglican burial services. Brahms denied that the Requiem had any individual application. He said he had "the whole of humanity in mind" when he wrote it.

Rich said he selected the work for the special performance because of its value in the training of his students as well as for its enjoyment by listeners who appreciate great choral music.

A tea honoring Rev. and Mrs. Charles B. Trammel will be given at the Community Building here on Sunday afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock by the First Baptist Church. The tea is being given by the church honoring his retirement and for the fifteen years service Rev. and Mrs. Trammel have rendered to the church and the community, and special invitation is extended to pastors and membership of other churches in the county.

Rev. Trammel, with his family, came to Burnsville as pastor of the First Baptist Church in January 1949.

Rev. Trammel was born in Rutherford County and is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Buford Trammel. He graduated from Wake Forest College in 1926, and in the same year was married to Miss Anne Hurst of Durham. Rev. and Mrs. Trammel have two children, a son, Charles Jr.

of Elkin and Mrs. Max Adams Fox of Boone, and four grand children.

Following his graduation at Wake Forest College, Rev. Trammel completed one year's work at Duke University in the School of Religion. His seminary work was at Louisville, Ky.

Before coming to Burnsville, Rev. Trammel's pastorates include two years at Washington, N. C., nine years at Columbus, N. C., and twelve years at Troy, N. C.

Rev. Trammel has served on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention for twelve years. He was a member of the Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention for three years, and was on the Board of Trustees of Wake College while in Troy. He is a trustee of Mars Hill College and is a member of the Executive Committee of that college and is also a member of the Advisory Committee of Wake Forest College. He has been for four years chairman of the committee for the administration of the Assembly at Caswell near Wilmington. He was moderator for the Montgomery Association for ten years.

Rev. Trammel has also been active in civic organizations. He is a Mason, was president of the Rotary Club at Troy and was president of the Montgomery Saddle Horse Association. He is a member of the Men's Club here and was the first chairman of the Blood Bank in Burnsville.
