#### Contracts Let For Construction Of Sewage Disposal System

Contracts have been let for the weather permitting, construction will be shortly under way.

The Town Board reports the welcome news that the new facilities will cost appreciably less than the original estimate of \$360,000. It now appears, on the basis of bids received and contracts let, that the total cost will be more than \$300,000.

Word has just been received thr- Edge, Bass Penland; ough Representative Roy A. Taylor that the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency has approved a loan of \$175,000 to finance the town's portion of the cost of facilities. This is the amount the voters of Burnsville authorized the town to borrow in the election on September 22.
