insurance Industry Will Push Ahead With Over from 7:30 to 11:30 p. m. 65 Protection

Greensboro, Jan. 24 The insurance industry will push ahead with its programs of protection for persons over 65. regardless of Congressional action on 'medicare', the vice president of the Virginia-North Carolina 65 Health Insurance Association declared to-

R. F. Jones of Greensboro said the coopperative industry group make this sing a great success which he serves feels the coverage enrolled, in addition to possible binefits under any legislation thus far proposed,

"We are now providing broad basic and major medical coverage at reasonable cost to more than 30,000 senior citizens of the two states. In seven months operation we have paid claims totalling \$800.000. We are meeting a need, and we are confident we will continue to do so for an increasing number of persons,' Jones said.

"The widespread impression that 'medicare' would immediately take care of medical expenses for persons over 65 is misleading," he added. "The fact is that no bill has been seriously discussed which would cover more than a basic portion of medical tharges."

He also pointed out that time would be required for implemen-For the shuffle of your feet; tion of any system of 'medicare' benefits, after legislation is on-

"The real danger is that persons 65 and older will be lulled into a false sense of protection. with the idea that full coverage of medical care expenses is just around the corner," Jones asserted. "The truth is that the problem of health care for senior When for some reason you and citizens is one which continues to demand the best efforts of all groups concerned."


