

### Three Million In N.C. Have Been Immunized Against Polio

Raleigh, May 31.— More than three-million North Carolinians have been immunized against poliomyelitis with the Sabin Oral Vaccine, according to county by coun-

ty reports just compiled by the State Medical Society Office here. The Medical Society, through its Committee on Child Health and Poliomyelitis, now urges all first grade children entering school next fall, who have completed a series of polio immunizations, to also obtain a booster dose prior to the start of the fall

school term.

Dr. Richard S. Kelly, Jr., of Fayetteville, Chairman of the Medical Society's Committee on Child Health and Poliomyelitis recommends that all children not having availed themselves of the immunization, or who have come into the state without immunization, should commence a ser-

ies of oral polio vaccine immediately. He also recommends that children who have taken only a partial course of immunization should certainly complete the recommended doses during the remaining Spring weeks before the Summer. The Sabin Oral Polio immunizations are particularly recommended for

children and young adults through the ages of 18 years.

Persons needing booster doses or a full course of immunization are encouraged to communicate with their family physician for information and direction about the immunization.

The Medical Society official praised the efforts of the many volunteer organizations and individuals in North Carolina who assisted the various County Medical Societies in organizing, promoting and staffing the "Stop-Polio" clinics. Without these volunteers, he said, such an effective program would not have been possible.

Dr. Kelly said that the recommendations that persons through the age of 18 take the Sabin Oral vaccine are in line with those of an Advisory Committee to the Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service, and that when given to this group it is safe, effective and easy to take.
