Mrs. Fox Selected To Attend Science Institute



Mrs. Jeanette B. Fox of -RFD 1, Burnsville was selected to attend the NDEA Library Science Institute at Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone. This program is under the National Defense Education Act, as amended in 1964. The institute is being held June 7 through July 13, with fifty persons attending from North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, tucky, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, and Virginia.

The content of the program will be organized around. six areas: 1-Building a Basic Collection for an Elementary School Libra y; 2—Evaluating Children's Books and Materials; 3-Folklore, Fantasy, and Storytelling; 4-Books of Information; 5-Poetry; and 6-Writing, Illustrating and Publishing Books for Children.

Many noted authors, illustrators and editors will serve as lecturers and consultants. Miss Beaulah Campbell is director of the institute.

Mrs. Fox is a teacher in the Burnsvi le Elementary School, and she participated in the Comprehensive School Improvement Project in the school this year. She is a graduate of East Tennessee State University and is an alumna member of Phi Mu Fraternity.

N. C. On Producer Dairy Honor Roll

Jake F. Buckner, District Sanitarian, Spruce Pine, N. C. has announced that he has just received a letter from the U. S. Pubic Health Department listing all the counties and cities that attained the Honor Roll in their p oducer dairies and for their milk and the enforcement used.

In order for a County or City Health Department to make the Honor Roll the latest U. S. Public Health Service Milk Ordinance and Code must have been substantially complied with.

Listed below are the states having county or city Health Departments and the Dairies that made the Honor Roll. Out of the fifty states only 18 states made the honor roll. The number of departments in each of these 18 states are listed. They are:

Alabama 1; Arizona 1; Arkansas 1; Colorado 15; Nevada 1: New Mexico 4: North Carolina 69; Oklahoma 14; Tennessee 37; Texas 37; Utah 3; Virginia 7; Washington 4; Wisconsin 21; Georgia 19; Kentucky 22; Mississippi 23; and Missouri 7.
