BIDS OPENED FOR MARS HILL GYM

MARS HILL - Bids totalling \$1,340,965 for the construction of a huge new gymnacium - physical education building at Mars Hill College were opened here Wednesday.

Dickerson Inc. of Monroe was the low bidder on the general contract. Low bidders for sub contracts for plumbing, electrical work and heating and ventilating were Sanitary Plumbing & Heating Co. of Greenville, S. C., Bryant Electric Co. of Brevard and Moser Plumbing Co. of Ashevi le respectively.

Amounts of the individual bids were not made public by the college.

Robert Wrenn of Gastonia, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee of the board of trustees, said contracts will be awarded within the next few days, as soon as certain technical details have been ironed out.

Other members of the committee present for the openings were J. David Taylor of Charlotte, the Rev. Henry Crouch of Winston-Salem and the Rev. John Knight of Asheville.

Dr. Robert Garrison of Charlotte, Mrs. Leon Seymour of Southern Pines, Lee Cain of Winston-Salem and Peyton Ivie of Murphy are also members of the committee.

Six Associates Inc. of Asheville designed the building and will coordinate the engineering during construction. Henry Gaines, head of the firm, said he hopes construction can begin within the next two weeks. He estimated months.

The 75,000-square-foot building will be approximately 265 feet wide by 188 feet deep. It will be located adjacent to a new football stadium and track which will be utilized for the first time this fall.

Sgt. Arrowood Returns To Ft. Bragg

FORT BRAGG, N. C. (AHT-NC)-Army Sgt. Raphe Arrowood, son of Mrs. Essie C. Arrowood, Route 2, Burnsville. N. C., has returned to Fort Bragg, N. C., after serving with the inter-American peace force in the Dominion Republic.

Sergeant Arrowood is a forward observer in the 82d Airborne Division, which formed part of the peace force established by the Organization of American States.

The 22-year-old soldier entered the Army in July, 1962. He is a graduate of Cane River High School.

Dr. Hoyt Blackwell, president of the college, has emphasized to alumni that the huge structure will not be simply a place to play basketball but that it will be a physical education building. It will contain a full-size basketball court with seats for approximately 3,000 spectators. but it will also contain other courts, playing areas, dressing rooms, classrooms, rest rooms and offices.

"It will be a highly functional multi-purpose building," explained Don Henderson, athletic director and head of the department of physical education.

"It will provide the facilities we need for five major programs," he said. "It will serve our (1) academic programs in physical education, (2) the gym classes we require of all able-bodied students, (3) intramural sports programs for both men and women, (4) our entire program of intercollegiate sports and (5) general recreation for both students and faculty."

Financing the construction completion will take 15-18 of the building will require extensive fund-raising campaign, Dr. Blackwell said. Although some funds are on hand and the college has been authorized to borrow \$750,000 a substantial amount still must be raised from alumni and friends.

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
