Mrs. Johnson To Begin Crafts Lessons

Craft lessons use of native materials will begin Monday, 7:30 p. m. Oct. 18 at the South Toe School. Mrs. Andrew Johnson of Green Mountain will teach the craft course, sponsored by the PTA. The making and sale of wreaths, corsages and plaques provide a chance of raising income as well as helping the PTA help the school, according to Alice B. Hopson, home economics extension agent.

Persons interested in learning to make wreaths and corsages will want to collect native materials such as assorted pine cones in various types and sizes; buckeyes, chestnuts, hickory nuts, acorns, hazelnuts, peach seeds, pecans, sweet gum balls, walnut beechnuts and burs, chinquapins, sycamore balls and any type of firm seed pods. These materials should be baked at 200 degrees for 1½ hours. (holes may be punched before baking, if desired.)

Adkins In Air Transport Exercise

Army Sgt. Wade H. Adkins, son of Rev. and Mrs. E. G. Adkins, Sr, 132 Lynch St., Rutherfordton, N. C., participated in an air transport exercise conducted by the 8th. Infantry Division in Germany, ending Sept. 13.

Sgt. Adkins and other members of the Inf. were trained in the proper procedures for loading and moving men and equipment using U. S. Air Force aircraft.

The 25-year old soldier, a team leader in Company C of the Infantry's 1st Battalion near Baumholder, Germany, entered the army in May 1963 and completed basic training at Fort Gordon, Ga.

He attended Cane River High School, Burnsville.


The support and backing of parents and community agencies is essential if East Yancey reaches this worthwhile goal.
