If you're looking for a good novel you should find something exactly suited to your reading preferences among the following new books acquired by your Avery-Mitchell- Yancey Public Library:

SLOWLY, BY THE HAND UNFURLED by Romuluc Linney. A highly dramatic novel full of co'or and suspense. It's also a fascinating exercise in self-destruction, but it's final strength rests in its compassionate treatment of human guilt and suffering.

YANKEE FOODLE DANDY by Noel B. Gerson. A biographical novel about John Hancock, told against the thriling background of a young nation's striving for freedom; filled with the drama and intense excitement of the most stirring period in America's history.

HOW FAR TO BETHLE-HEM? by Norah Lofts A brilliant re-telling of the most beautiful story of all time. She brings her readers a rare and exquisite experience so deeply moving that it transcends time and fimiliarity.

MESSIAH by Gore Vidal. This book, in Vidal's characteristically urbane sty'e, will arouse anger and resentment in some people; it will stir and startle others; it will orin reade"s and make them think.

THE MALLOT DIARIES by Robert Nathan. A love story involving the eternal struggle between generations, between the young and the old.

THE MAN WITH THE GOLD GUN. The last of the "James Bond" novels written by Ian Fleming before his death. It is considered equaly as good as any of its dozen predecessors which relate the adventures of Operative 007.

#### THIS THE LAW

This is the first of a fall series of articles which will appear each week throughout the next three months. They have been written for the non-lawyer as a public service of the North Carolina Bar Association.

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May any person kill a mad dog?

Yes. The statutes of North Carolina expressly so provide.

The statutes also permit any person to kill any dog "if he is killing sheep, cattle, hogs, or poult-y."

If a person knows, or has good reason to believe, that his dog is mad and has bitten another person, he becomes criminally liable if he neglects or refuses immediately to kill the dog, and. further forfeits \$50 to him who will sue therefor, as well as being civily liable for damages to the person bitten. ....

Is it a criminal offense for an owner or keeper of a dog to fail to list the same for taxes?

Yes. The owner of the home or lessee of such home is responsible for listing any dog belonging to any member of his family.

Is a blind person entitled to be accompanied by his "seeing-eye dog" or "guide dog" on all public conveyances and to all other places of public accomodations?

Yes. Such dogs, when educated by a recognized training agency or school, have privileges other dogs do not have when they accompany blind persons.

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Are there any laws protecting horses on the highways?

Yes. Under the statutes of North Carolina the driver of a motor vehicle, on signal by raising the hand of a person riding, leading or driving a horse or other d-aft animal, bring his motor vehicle immediately to a stop.

If the horse or other draft animal appears badly frightened, and the driver of the moto: vehicle is signaled to do so, the motor of the vehicle
