Pine Trees Can Produce Longtime Yield

In a recent survey of 98 pine plantations in the Tennessee Valley foresters found that idle land planted to pine trees can produce a long-time yield of between \$7 and \$28 per acre per year. The average return was \$15 per acre per year over the life of the trees.

The first commercial thinning came as early as 14 years from planting ,but on the average it came when the trees were twenty years cld, and yielded 7 cords of wood per acre worth \$29 as stumpage.

According to John Nicholson, District Forester of the North Carolina Division of Forestry, Yancey County has approx mately 10,140 acres which should be planted to trees. "If this land were refcrested," he says, "it would produce an _average annual income of \$152 thousand to the landowners of Yancey County, and would help provide the base for 100 new full-time jobs in wood harvesting, processing, and utilization.

"Many landowners own relatively small tracts of land and feel that their reforestation activities would be too small to make a significant contribution to themselves or to the economy of the country." Mr. Nicholson states this assumption is in er- ' ror, for there are many ways a landowner benefits from the reforesting of just one acre of idle land.

To begin with, most people want to improve their property and have it in better shape when it is sold or turned over to heirs. This is simply the practice of good stewardship. Trees planted on idle or eroded land immediately make the property more valuable. It's just the same if you'd sell a farm just before the corn was harvested. - you'd expect more because a crop was already established.

Another benefit one will receive by planting trees on eroded land is erosion control. Moderate erosion will be checked in only three to five years and the soil will be built up again.

An example of what tree planting can mean is the plantation of Chuck Smith of Penland, North Carolina. Mr. Smith owns 2 acres of white pine planted on an eroded field in 1945. The first cut was in 1963 at age 18. and yielded 16 cords of pulpwood worth \$48. Foresters estimale that over the next 27 years Mr. Smith will be able to cut an additional 66 cords of pulpwood worth \$198, plus 82,000 board feet of sawtimber worth \$2,050. Thus on previously eroding land Mr. Smith's pine will earn \$26 per acre per year over the life of the trees.

People who have planted trees are the strongest supporters of getting our idle land planted. Mr. Smith says: "Tree planting and tree
