Active pallbearers will be men teachers and boys of the Senior Class of Cane River High School. The lady teachers and girls of the Senior Class will act as flower girls.


The body will remain at Holcombe Brothers Funeral Home until taken to the church to lie in state thirty minutes prior to the service.
