Adult Education Classes In Progress

Mrs. Shaby B. Humphries, local director of Adult Education in Mitchell and Yancey counties announces that classes are now in progress in the Deyton Elementary School in Spruce Pine and the South Toe School in Yancey County.

Classes are being held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p. m. There are now five classes in Mitchell county and four in Yancey, with the possibility of another class being started in the South Toe area soon.

This program is open to any adult 18 years of age or older who desire to improve their reading and writing abilities. This phase of the program is becoming more and more important.

The other important phase of this program is to bring a person up to a level in which he can pass the State General Education Development test and receive the High School equivalency certificate which is issued by the State Department of Public Instruction.

These classes are FREE, and all material will be furnished.

Yancey county residents in the South Toe area may register for the classes by coming to the South Toe School on Thursday night, March 10 at 6:30 p. m., or by writing to Mrs. Humphries at 225 Walnut Ave., Spruce Pine.

Mitchell county residents may enroll in the program by calling 765-4248 in Spruce Pine.

Ramsey Announces For House Seat



Liston B. Ramsey, running for Representative in the district made up of Madison, Haywood and Yancey Counties, was born in Marshall, N. C., 47 years ago. He attended Marshall High School Mars Hill College, and is a World War II Veteran. He has been engaged in retail building materials business for 12 years. He is a member of the Marshall Baptist Church, is a Mason, VFW, American Legion; a member of the board of directors of the Madison County Development Board; Treas. of MATO Packing Company. He served as representative from Madison County in the General Assembly in 1961-63, including a special session. Chairman of the Madison County Democratic Executive Committee for eight years. He was a member of the appropriations committee in 1962-63, vice chairman of the committee on Public Welfare during the 1963 ses-

sion; Vice Chm. of Committee on Roads in the 1963 session; Chmn. of the Committee on Justices of the Peace during the 1963 session. He served on the Legislative Council during 1963 and 1964, and was assigned to the sub-committee that made a study of the Highway Patrol for the purpose of making recommendations, many of which were accepted by the 1965 session of the General Assembly.

Mr. Ramsey is married to the former Florence McDevitt of Marshall. They have one daughter, Martha, age 17.

Asheville Boy Named Easter Seal Child

CHAPEL HILL — David Benjamin Golson, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Golson of Asheville, North Carolina has been named State Easter Seal Child for 1966. He was appointed by L. H. Mount, Durham, president of the North Carolina Society for Crippled Children and Adults (The Easter Seal Society).

During the Easter Seal Campaign, which covers the month of March and ends on April 10, Easter Sunday, David will bring a message of hope and a promise for an independent future for crippled children who are helped by Easter Seal contributions. He will greet Easter Seal volunteers as the guest of Mrs. Dan K. Moore, the state's first lady, at a Tea on March 17, St. Patrick's Day.

David is 15 years old and has attended Camp Easter in the Pines, at Southern Pines, a camp for crippled children owned and operated by the Easter Seal Society. He cites his experiences at Camp Easter as the most exciting of his life, saying: "I enjoyed the swimming, the nature studies, the arts and crafts! The food was wonderful and all the people were so nice to me."

He also constantly talks of the outstanding beauty of the setting of the Camp and when visited by Easter Seal state officers recently, he immediately said he wanted to attend two sessions of the camp next summer.

He is a student at the Asheville Orthopedic Hospital and according to his teachers is a bright, responsive boy who makes good grades.
