POLLING PLACES FOR BURLEY FilmShowing REFERENDUM DESIGNATED At Library

Polling places for the March 10 referendum on acreage-poundage marketing quotas for the next three crops of burley tobacco have been designated by the Yancey County ASCS Committee as follows:

East Burnsville, Yancey ASCS Office; West Burnsville, Carl Penlands Service Station: Cane River, Proffitt's Store; Upper Egypt, Lloyd Millers' Store; Lower Egypt, Arthur Edwards' Store: Ramseytown, Regular Polling Place; Green Mountain, Regular Polling Place; Brush Creek, Community Building; Upper Jacks Creek Higgins' Store; Lower Jacks Creek, Robert Whitson Store; East Crabtree, Woodrow Howell Store; West Crabtree, Dellinger & Silvers Store: Upper South Toe, Eugene Harrison Store; Lower South Toe, Emory Chrisawn Store; Pensacola, P. B. Wilson Store; Prices Creek, Regular Polling Place.

The polls will be open from 8:09 a. m. to 6:00 pm.

Notices of farm acreage allotments and poundage quotas as well as allotments under the program now in effect have been mailed to all burley tobacco farm operators so that they may know these program details in advance of the referendum.

If more than two-thirds of the growers voting in this special referendum Prote YFS. the acreage-poundage quotas provided by the new program will be in effect for the 1966, 1967. and 1968

crops of burley tobacco.

If the acreage-poundage program is not approved, that is if as many as onethird of those voting NO, the present marketing quota program on an acreage basis will remain in effect. All burley tobacco growers are urged to vote on this important question. All farmers 18 years of age or older who engaged in the production of the 1965 burley tobacco crop are eligible to vote in the special referendum.

Highway Com Posts Load Limits

RALEIGH - The State Highway Commission today posted load limits on the following secondary roads. Due to the recent bad weather, the following secondary roads were posted for a maximum 13,000 pound axle load to prevent further damage from heavy axle loads.

SR-1001 from NC-63 to the Madison County Line SR-1003 from US-19 and US-23 to SR-2114, SR-2427 from SR-2416 to SR-2428, SR-2148 from NC-197 to US-19 and US-23 and SR-2150 from NC-197 to SR-2154.

It is expected that these restrictions will be removed late in April, 1966 after the weather has become more moderate and the roads have had an opportunity to dry out.


Schools To Operate Seven Saturdays
