

Youst Announces For House



Robert L. Youst, 43, a Clyde resident and chiropractor for the past 16 years in Canton, is a candidate for Democratic nomination for state representative in the 47th House District, composed of Haywood, Madison and Yancey counties. The district elects two members to the House.

A West Virginia native who grew up and attended schools in Maryland, Youst served as pharmacist mate and x-ray technician with the U. S. Navy medical corps during World War II, with duty in the Pacific Theater. After the war he studied at Lincoln Chiropractic College in Indianapolis, Ind., after which he moved to this area. He is a member of Varner Flinehart American Legion Post, the Young Democratic Club, the Haywood County Wildlife Club; served twice president of Clyde Lions Club, and is a former Clyde troop committee chairman for the Boy Scouts.

In Youst's first try for public office, he announces the following platform:

For increased law enforcement to our highways, particularly in regard to speeding, recklessness and driving under the influence of alcohol.

For support and encouragement by the public of all law enforcement officers to impartially carry out their duties.

Against present auto inspection law.

Vitally interested in problems of sportsmen, hunters and fishermen.

Against children under age 14 having to buy a special state trout stamp.

For economy in government.

Against any increase in the state sales tax. Against any other unreasonable taxes.

For practical programs to increase industrial jobs and tourism.

If elected, says Youst, he will try to serve the best interest of the people of the district.

Youst is married to the former Clara Stevenson of Haywood County. They have one daughter, Barbara, a student at Western Carolina College.

The Rev. Lloyd Glenn and the Rev. E. J. Hall officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.

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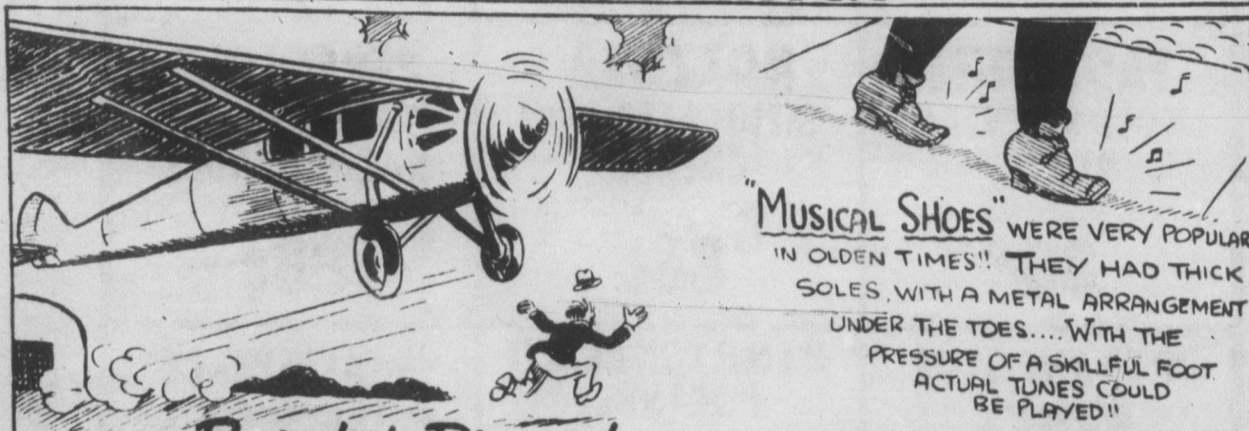
