

C. these trainees came to Yancey County to live and work. Each lived with a local family and met and worked with the various agencies and projects in the county. The volunteers spoke with Mrs Ruby Smith Acting Director of the Welfare, Mrs. Thomas at the Library, and other agency heads They a'so had a working contract with the Neighborhood Youth Corps Adult Education classes, and community films showings.

But most of all this was a chance for these voluntteers to line in and experience a culture and way of life somewhat different from their own. It was a chance for them to realize that the mountain culture is as American as can be; yet it is also distinctive. The fast paced city life met the casual rural life, perhaps for the first time for these vol-During these 3 unteers. weeks these trainees gained an experience that will fit them to be excellent community workers.

For the VISTA. training officers were very well pleased with the training schedule set up by the Extension-WA.M.Y. team and they have asked that future groups of the vollunteers ge allowed to train in Yancey County.


Roy A. Taylor To Speak At Chamber Dinner
