WAMY Board Meeting Sept. 26

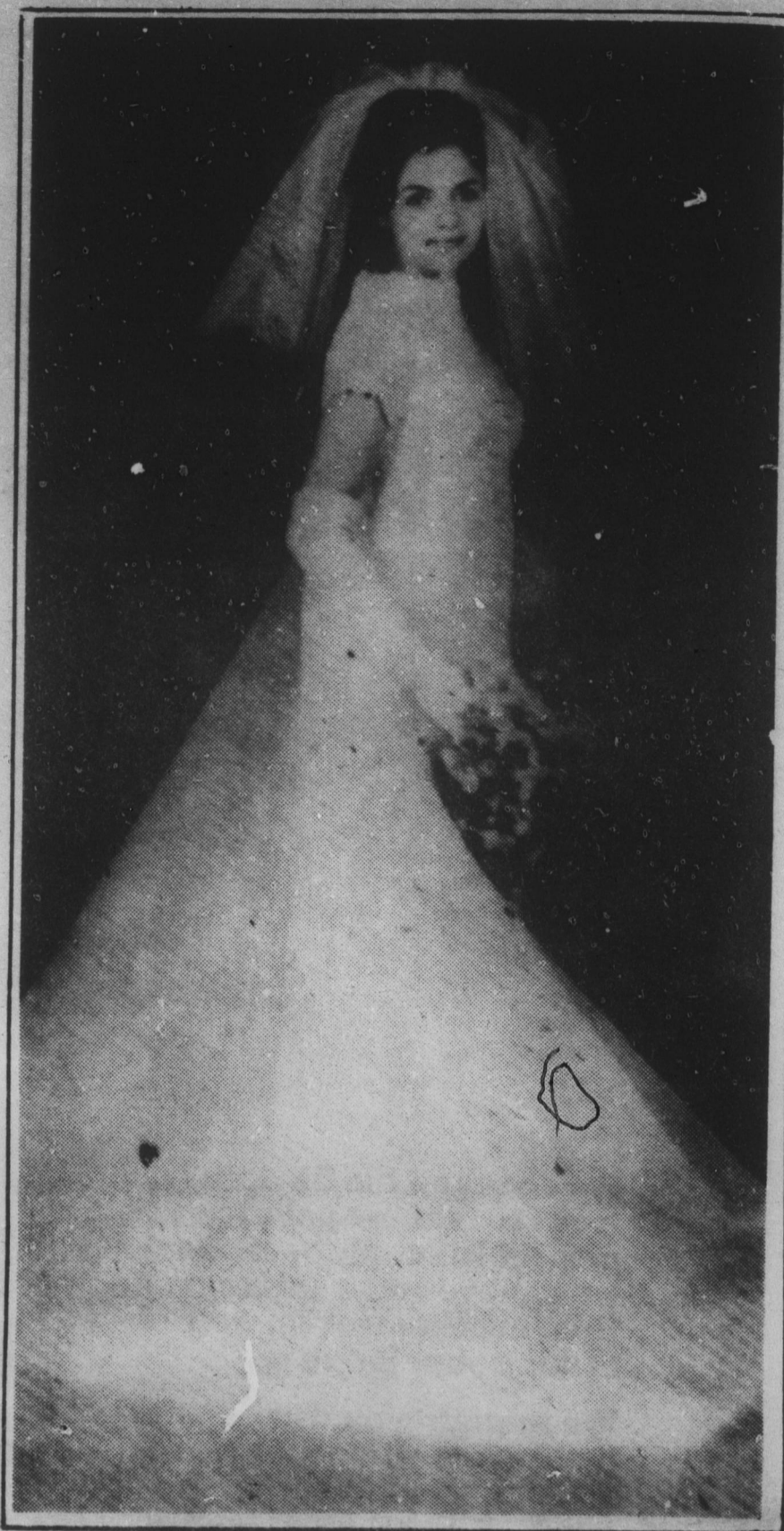
