

Hwy. Patrol Recruiting Men

RALEIGH — The North Carolina State Highway Patrol is in the process of recruiting 30 men for an interim patrol training school tentatively scheduled November 19 at the State Fairgrounds Youth Center in Raleigh.

Major E. W. Jones, who heads the Patrol's training and inspection division, says the interim school is necessary due to increases in authorized strength approved by the 1967 General Assembly.

The legislature authorized an increase in Patrol strength of 125 men over the biennium 1967-69.

Major Jones noted there is a Patrol School underway now at the Institute of Government in Chapel Hill in which 34 men are enrolled. This school will be concluded on December 15.

"Currently," Major Jones said, "There are 49 vacancies in the enforcement division, and we are not scheduled to begin another school in Chapel Hill until January 8, 1968."

The patrol officers said, "according to tentative plans, the school will begin November 19, at the State Fairgrounds Youth Center in Raleigh.

We would like very much to

have 30 qualified men to swear in and place in this interim school," Major Jones said.

The basic requirements for becoming a state trooper are: 21 to 30 years of age, a U. S. Citizen, with a high school diploma or equivalent, at least 5 feet 9½ inches in height and 160 pounds.

Any young man, who meets these qualifications, can obtain additional information by contacting the local trooper, the district sergeant, Troop headquarters, or state headquarters.

There are 36 sergeant's districts located throughout the state, six troop headquarters (Greenville, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Greensboro, Salisbury or Asheville) and the State Highway Patrol Headquarters, located in the Motor Vehicles Building, Raleigh, N. C.

Veterans Obtain VA Home Loans

More than 140,000 veterans, almost 5000 of them in North Carolina, who have served since the Korean Conflict have obtained VA-guaranteed home loans totalling almost \$2.3 billion under the GI Bill which became effective in March last year, W. R. Phillips, Manager of

the Winston-Salem Veterans Administration Regional Office, said today.

An additional 7,695 have obtained direct loans from the Veterans Administration amounting to \$92,488,000.

All figures are through July 1967, Phillips said.

Veterans eligible for this program include those who served at least 181 continuous days in the Armed Forces, with some eligible are persons still in the Armed Forces, provided they had at least two years in active duty status.

The 1966 law, PL 89-358, permits the Veterans Administration to guarantee up to \$7,500, or 50 per cent, of loans which eligible veterans may obtain from private lenders. The guarantee in many cases makes it possible for veterans to obtain home loans with a low down payment — or no down payment at all.

VA also makes direct loans to veterans in certain isolated and rural areas where private lending facilities are not available. Under 1967 legislation, effective October 1, the limit was extended from \$17,000 to \$25,000.

Phillips said veterans planning to buy a home may obtain additional information and certificates of eligibility from the Veterans Administration Regional Office, at 301 North Main Street, Winston-Salem, N. C. 27102.
