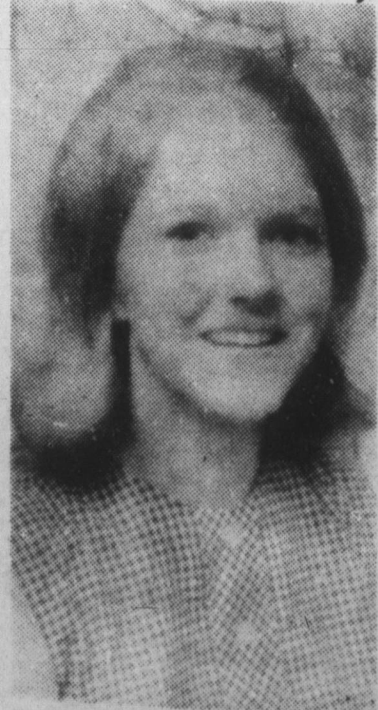

Local Women Attend District Club Meeting

Mrs. Margaret Tyner, President of the Burnsville Woman's Club, Mrs. Marion Holcombe and Miss Zoe Young, attended the Annual Meeting of District Two of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, which met in Hendersonville Thursday, October 19.

The keynote speaker was Mr. Clyde Greenway, who heads the Community Improvement Program in the Southeast for Sears Roebuck & Co. Mr. Greenway stressed the importance of citizens of all localities, and particularly the tourist centers of Western N. C., knowing the points of interest in their town or community, and doing a good selling job to people with whom they come in contact, particularly the traveling public. He said that on numerous occasions, when traveling through the towns and countryside he had stopped at filling stations and restaurants, and made it a point to inquire of service station employees, restaurant owners, waitresses, etc., the places of interest in their town, and invariably the answer would be "nothing", and in some instances he would be told he just as well travel on, as there was nothing of interest around there — this is face of the fact that there might be places of historic interest, national or state parks, beautiful scenery, etc. He said the public, and particularly people serving the public, should be better trained in this area, and should be enthusiastic about their town or county and go all out to do a good selling job; and that this was particularly true of Western N. C., where tourism was big business. We wonder if Burnsville could not stand a little educating along this line.
