Sechler Serving Aboard USS Ranger

(SO182) USS RANGER (CVA-61) (FHTNC) Dec. 7 — Navy Lieutenant William R. Sechler, son of Mr and Mrs. W. R. Sechler of Burnsville, N. C., and husband of the former M'ss Joanna Banks of Millsville, Va., is serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger in the Western Pacific.

The 75,000 ton aircraft carrier recently joined the U. S. Seventh Fleet for its third deployment to the Gulf of Tomkin where it will assist in meeting the United States' commitment in Vietnam.

Prior to this deployment the Ranger successfully completed an Operational Readiness Inspection training phase and was tagged "Combat Ready." Heart Transplant

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. --The rules say that the historymaking heart transplant, performed recently in South Africa, should fail.

"There are so many reasons it should fail — the 'plumbing' may fail, or it may fail because it is a foreign homograft." said Dr. J. L. Gowans, experimental pathologist at Oxford University, who was in Waston-Salem last week as the heynote speaker for the fourth national scient fic meeting of the Reticuloendothelial Society.

The chief threat to the success of the operation, Gowans said, is the lymphocytes. These are circulating white cells in human blood and they play roles of b-th hero and villian in the life drama.

Lymphocytes "smell out," and destroy harmful bacteria. But they also react the same way to life-giving organ grafts, which they restard as foreign material. Rejection is the principal bacrier to free exchance of human tissue, Gowans said. Survey would be revolution'zed if the reaction against frueien material could be neutralized in transplant cases. A tremendous amount of work is being done in this area by medical scientists and Gowane holores the problem eventually will be overcome
