Advice To Veterans Seeking Home Loans

Veterans seeking home loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration are advised by W. R. Phillips, Manager of the Winston-Salem Regional Office, to be cautious about getting involved in "side deals" or "tie-in-sales" as a condition to purchasing a home.

There have been cases in which veterans have been requested or even required to purchase items of furniture or other merchandise, Phillips said. These are paid for in cash and not from the proceeds of the loan guaranteed or insured by the VA. In some cases the items have been so overpriced as to constitute additional consideration for the purchase of a home.

Sometimes these offers are legitimate and benefit the veteran, and the VA has no objection to such purchases so long as they are not paid for with the proceeds of the loan.

In any case, Phillips said, where the seller and purchaser have entered into a "side arrangement" or "tie-in-sale" involving personal property to evade the G. I. statutory requirement that the purchase price of the home not be in excess of the reasonable value established by the VA appraisal, the VA is required to investigate the matter thoroughly.

In cases where a "side deal" or "tie-in-sale" appears to be involved, details must be revealed to the VA, which reserves the right to inspect and appraise the items involved before approving a loan.

Social Security News

(Note: At the time this is written the President has not yet signed the new Amendments into law.)

Q. Now that Congress has again overwhelmingly passed a bill increasing and expanding Social Security, we wish you'd explain a few "fundamentals" of the system, helping us to understand better what it is and what it's doing?

A. Social Security is a social insurance program enacted by Congress pursuant to its power under the Constitution to "promote the general welfare."

The system is primarily designed to meet the broad, basic need of the Nation's workers and their families for protection against loss of earnings ("work income") due to old age and retirement, disability, and death of the family breadwinner.

While recognizing the great importance of the retirement or "pension" provisions, we must also remember that Social Security provides a comprehensive "protection package" of Survivor - Disability - Retirement - and Health Insurance.

Today more than 23 million persons (retired workers and their wives, disabled workers and their families, and widows, orphans, etc.) are getting monthly benefits from this great package-program.

Over 90 percent of the people aged 65 and over are eligible for retirement benefits under this system. All but a few of the over 80 million wage earners and self-employed in this country are now covered by the program.

About 95 out of every 100 American children and their mothers have survivors insurance protection in case of the breadwinner's death, and also about 87 out of every 100 Americans aged 25-64 have disability insurance protection (against severe disability).

All but a small percentage of the aged social security beneficiaries rely on this program as their major source of support. Almost half of them have little or no income other than their social security checks.

Nevertheless, this very American system is not only for the poor. It provides a base of economic security on which all can build. It not only helps the aged whose incomes are now too low but assures that the aged of the future will be better off.

It surely is the most effective poverty-preventing program.

Those who have worked and paid social security taxes and become "insured" are entitled to benefits regardless of their economic and financial circumstances. To deny these benefits to certain individuals because "they don't need them" would in effect penalize them for successful achievement; and would tend to discourage initiative, thrift, self-reliance, and other basic principles of our economic system.

The American Social Security program encourages and reinforces the incentives to work and save, to succeed, to invest and accumulate. Within the minimum and maximum limits of benefits payable, the higher the earnings the higher the benefits will be.

Moreover, any "nest egg" of savings or investments that one can provide for his own and his family's future will not interfere with his or their earned right to benefits under this program. (Of course, one must meet certain eligibility requirements — work credits, age, retirement or disability, relationship, depend-

ency, etc. These are necessary, for one thing, to preserve the financial soundness of the system.)

Social Security is the basic floor of financial protection against certain hazards of life common to us all — old age, disability or illness, and death.

Naturally, as we all know, each individual should if possible — and to the extent possible — provide additional protection with private insurance and savings, investments, and perhaps another retirement income or pension.

Attorneys Announce Candidacy

Attorneys J. E. (Peck) Holshouser of Boone and J. Ray Braswell of Newland have announced their candidacy for Republican nomination for the two District Court Judgeships going into effect in the Twenty-Fourth Judicial District in December 1968.

The District is composed of Watauga, Avery, Mitchell, Yancey and Madison Counties.

The District Courts will hear misdemeanors, domestic relations, juvenile cases and civil matters involving up to \$5000.00.

Courts will be held in each of the five counties of the District at frequent regular intervals. It is estimated that the District Courts will make final disposition of the great majority of the cases which now overcrowd the Superior Court dockets and calendars.

Both Holshouser and Braswell have practiced law in the area for a number of years. They state that they have become candidates for the two judgeships allotted to the District in recognition of the importance of having trained lawyers preside over the Courts.

Gift Made To Baptist Hospital

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. — A \$1-million gift from the Duke Endowment Fund of Charlotte has been awarded to North Carolina Baptist Hospital. A portion of the grant will support a new paramedical school at the medical center. The remainder will be used in the construction of a 14-story addition to the hospital.

The contract for the construction of the 55,000-square-foot paramedical school facility was awarded last week to King-Hunter, Inc., of Greensboro. The project, scheduled to be completed in 14 months, will cost \$1.8 million.

Contracts for the construction of the 14-story hospital and clinics building, part of the \$28-million expansion program of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Baptist Hospital, are expected to be signed next summer.

One-fourth of the Duke Endowment gift has been received by the hospital, which will get an additional \$250,000 annually during the next three years.

With these funds, Baptist Hospital has received more than \$2.5 million from Duke Endowment since its philanthropic program was established in 1924.

The new paramedical training facility will enable the medical center to double its present paramedical student enrollment of 357.
