# Miss Bennett Nominated For Reynolds Scholarship



The Reynolds Scholarships were established by the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation in memory of Mrs. Katherine Smith Reynolds, a Woman's College (now UNC-G) alumna, wife of the founder of Reynolds Tobacco Company, and mother of the late R. J. Reynolds, Jr.

The Foundation recently made a grant of \$65,800 to support the awards and the annual Reynolds Lecture during the 1968-69 academic year at UNC-G.

GREENSBORO — Alumnae committees appointed for every county in North Carolina are this month interviewing the 256 nominees for the Katherine Smith Reynolds Scholarships at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

Serving on the Committee for Yancey County is Mrs. Reece L. McIntosh, Jr., of Burnsville.

Nominee from the county, an outstanding member of her graduating class, is Ruth Elizabeth Bennett of Cane River High School, Betty is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Bennett of Boute 3, Burnsville.

There are presently 48 Reynolds Scholars at UNC-G. Twelve scholarships are awarud to each freshman class. The awards are valued at \$1,400 and are renewable for four years of study.

The selection of Reynolds finalists was delegated to the Alumni Association of UNC-G by the Reynolds Foundation when the program was in tiated in 1962. District committees were appointed to serve this function. J. W.llard Ray, 85, retired farmer of the Bolen's Creek section of Yancey County, died early Mon. Jan. 16 in a hospital after a short illness.

Mr. Ray, a lifelong resident of Yancey County, was a rural mail carrier and a member of the Yancey County school committee for many years. He was a member and deacon of Bolen's Creek Baptist Church.

### Huskins Appointed Associate Of State Supreme Court

Associate Justice J. Will Pless, Jr., of the State Supreme Court today advised Governor Moore that he will retire effective Saturday, February 3, 1968. Justice Pless will qualify as an Emergency Justice of the Court under the provisions of G. S. 7-51 and will be available as his services are needed.

To succeed Justice Pless, the Governor announced he will appoint the Honorable J. Frank Huskins, Director of the Administrative Off.ce of the Courts and a former Judge of the Superior Court.

"We regret losing the services of Justice Will Pless, who has given the full measure of service to the people of North Carol na throughout a long and illustrious career," Governor Moore said. "We wish him a happy retirement. At the same t.me, I feel the State is fortunate in having a man of the ability of Judge Hustring to assume this important position."

Justice Pless, who was appointed to the Court on January 20, 1966, told Governor Moore in a letter advising of his retirement:

"This is really a great Court. Every member of it is learned, industrious and ded cated. There can be no better court anywhere, and I do not know its equal. It has been a pleasure to be associated with the other just ces in spirit of harmony, cooperation and friendship, and I shall always cherish my relationship with them.

"There are many reasons why I am retiring. The main one is that I am just tired. After ten years as solicitor, thirty-two years on the superior court bench and two years on the Supreme Court, I feel the need of rest which I want to take while my health is good.

"In view of the assistance this court will have from the Court of Appeals, I am very hopeful that the work there will be reduced to the point that it can be accomplished with reasonable effort and labor, which is not now the case. All of the justices

are having to work several hours a night and on weekends in addition to the usual office hours. There is no such thing as a forty-hour week, but there are plenty that run to sixty or seventy hours. With respect and appreciation, J. Will Pless, Jr."

Justice Pless was born in Brevard in 1898. He attended Davidson College and the University of North Carolina, where he received his law degree in 1919.

He was a district solicitor from 1924 to 1934, when he was appointed to the Superior Court bench by the late Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus. He was elected four times without opposition and served as a Superior Court judge longer than any other North Carolinian.

Judge Huskins was born near Burnsville on February 10, 1911, He attended Mars Hill College from 1927 to 1929, the University of North Carolina, 1929-30, and the University of North Carolina Law School from 1930 until his graduation in 1932,

He was mayor of Burnoville from 1929 to 1942 when he resigned to accept a commission in the United States Navy.

He served as the Representative from Yancey County in the General Assembly sessions of 1947 and 1949.

On May 25, 1949, he was appointed chairman of the North Carolina Industrial Commission by W. Kerr Scott and was reappointed by Governor William B. Umstead on May 28, 1953. He resigned in January, 1955, to accept appointment by Governor Luther H. Hodges as a Superior Court judge. He was elected in November, 1956, to a full eightyear term as Resident Judge of the Twenty-Fourth Judicial District, composed of the counties of Madison, Yancey, Mitchell, Avery and Watauga, and was reelected in November, 1962, to an eight-year term.

He was appointed July 1, 1965, by Chief Justice Emery Denny as Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts, and was reappointed in February, 1966, by Chief Justice R .Himt Parker.
