Ted Dent Announces For Re-election To State Senate

Senator R. T. (Ted) Dent announced Friday that he had fled for re-election for one of the Thirty-first Senatorial District seats. This district is composed of Buncambe, Madison, Mitchell and Yancey Counties. The Thirty-five year old Spruce Pane businessman is President of Diamond Mica Company which has operations in Mitchell and Yancey Counties.

Senator Dent served h's Freshman term in the 1967 General Assembly as Republican Minority Wh p. He served on the Committees of Conservation & Development, Banking, Public Welfare and was the first Republican in "recent history" to serve on the powerful sevenman Calendar Committee. Several ammendments to the 1967 Water and Air Pollution Control Act and the Water Use Acts were adopted at his suggestion.

After the General Assembly adjourned, Senator Dent was appointed to a Legislative Research Sub-committee by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, which is study ng the credit and lending practices in North Carolina.

This committee will make its recommendations on any changes they feel are desirable under the current statutes to the 1968 session of the General Assembly

In the opening days of the 1967 sessice, Senator Item introduced a bill to block the initial Cable Television Referendum in Asheville. It was successful in passing the Senate but there was not enough time for it to get out of committee in the House of Representatives. It did serve to give publicity to the issue which was overwhelmingly defeated in the referendum.

The anti-poverty agency, WAMY, put forth a proposal to

start publication of a newspaper to be circulated in Watauga, Avery, Mitchell and Yancey Counties which was opposed by Senator Dent. After h s bil was introduced condemning this action on the part of the anti-poverty organization, their proposal was withdrawn due to public pressure.

I have served as Chairman of the Madison County Republican Executive Committee, Chairman of the 11th Congressional District, member of North Carolina Republican Central Committee, member of North Carolina Republican Executive Gommittee and as a member of the 1968 Republican Platform Committee.

I was elected to the 1967 General Assembly as a member of the Senate. During this session I served on such committees as Highways and Roads, Finance, Elections and Election Laws, Judic ary I and Censtitution, and at present am serving on a legislative committee rewriting the Cide of Civil Procedure.

I think that one of the most important problems facing our State is that of providing a realist c means of financing the basic and fundamental programs of our State, such as education, road construction and maintenance, and that the burden of taxation must not be borne by only a few. Educat on must be given our immediate attention.

The Laws pertaining to automobile lability insurance should be revised in keeping with interests of the automobile owners as well as the insurance industry.

The legislative procedures should be revised, eliminating the secret sessions of the appropriations sub-committee, where only a "hand-picked few" determine where approximately \$2.7 billion dollars will be spent for the next two years, as was practiced in the 1967 session of the General Assembly.

More concern and attention should be given for the construction and maintenance of secondary reads in mountain areas. Some of the mountain counties are virtually in the same condition roadwise as they were several years ago.

North Carolina has great potential and can be elevated from its low position stat stically, byfundamental, sound and honest government.
