# CONSTRUCTION TO BEGIN ON PRODUCERS' MARKET BUILDING

Byrd For sometime farmers of Yancey County have been leaving their farms and going elsewhere to seek employment, for the simple reason they could not make a living in Yancey County on their small farms. Farming methods have changed, along with the variety of crops grown. About the only cash crops in the county are tobacco and the growing livestock. Tobacco allotments have been cut so much it is hardly worth the time to

For the last few years there has been a lot of talk about keeping our farmers from leaving the county, and suggest-·iens made as to substitutions for tobacco. About the middle of August, 1966, Mr. Ya.es Deyton, John Ramsey, Tom Byrd and John Powers got together to see what could be worked out which would enable our farmers to make a living and remain in Yancey County. During our discussions it came to our attention that the growing of tomatoes had been a success in some of the surrounding counties. especially Madison. Investigations were carried on, along with interviews with people connected with the growing of tomatoes, to find out what was practical and feasable.

We were at once confronted with the idea that if we raised tomatoes we would have to have a warehouse in which to process them and from which to sell them. After securing the very valuable advice and support of Mr. E. L. Dillingham. County Agent, we called in a number of people connected with the Dept. of Agriculture for the State of N. C., to get their advice and opinion. At their suggestion, the Yancey County Producers' Association was organized, and a Board of Directors, consisting of eight men, was named. It was decided that the U.S. Government through the Farm Home Administration be asked for an appropriation to build and equip a suitable building to carry on this work. The help of Congressman Roy Taylor was enlisted.

In March 1967 Mr. Wilbur Howard, the new Director of the FHA arrived, and he, along with Mr. Paul Laughrun of Burnsville, Regional Director, entered en husias ically into helping secure the money, and with their help and the support of Congressman Taylor, \$165,000 was appropriated. The Board is also indebted to the Yancey County Chamber of Commerce for their cooperation and a small appropriation made by them.

Prior to receiving the money, the Board set out to obtain a proper site on which to erect

the building. They finally settled on a piece of land back of the Elwood Smith property. near the Sun Valley Nursing Home. A few of the more optimistic members of the Board purchased the property and held it until the money was received. Upon receipt of the money, the site was promptly transferred to the Yancey County Producers' Association. The services of an architect have been secured, the building site is now being graded, and construction will soon begin on a building 200 ft. long and 80 ft.

The Board of Directors feel that this will be a great asset to the farmers and all the citizens of Yancey County, and that it will bring into the county a lot of money, and enable the farmers to stay on their farms, if they want to grow tornatoes.

A building of this character and with these dimensions is big enough to accomodate other crops as well as tomatoes—such as can be profitably grown in Yancey County, such as strawberries, cucumbers. peppers, sweet corn, beans. The Board is investigating the possibility of expanding the use of the building in the future, but for this year the only crop to be handled will be tomatoes.

The building will be ready for use between July 15 and the first of August.
