Sgt. Robinson Receives Bronze Star

TUY HOA, VIETNAM (AHT-NC) — Army First Sergeant Owen Robinson, (rght), son of Mrs. Minnie Robinson, Route 3, Burnsville, N. C., receives the Bronze Star Medal during ceremonies near Tcy Hoa, Vietnam, May 10.

Sgt. Robinson received the award for outstanding meritorious service in combat operations against hostile forces in Vietnam from May 1967 to May 1968.

The sergeant, first sergeant of Company A, 577th Engineer Battalion near Tuy Hoa, entered the Army in April 1948 and completed basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C. He arrived in Vielnam in May 1967 and was last stationed with the 802nd Engineer Battalion.

His wife, Sue, lives at 961 E. Duane Ave., Sunnyvale, Calif. The sergeant, who holds the Army Commendat on Medal is a 1948 graduate of Bald Creek (N. C.) High School.

"Men often dream dreams of what could be. They recognize in their surroundings the ingredients for something better, for making things easier and more pleasant for themselves, for providing more meaningful and more beneficial life for their children. Too often those dreams are not fulfilled. For lack of resources, the potential is not realized. For lack of courage, the challenge is not confronted. For lack of initiative, the task is not begun. There are many who dream of better things and who do nothing to change reality."

These were the opening words of Gov. Dan Moore Tuesday as he addressed the Appalachian Development Conference at Ashevillle-Biltmore College.

The two-day Governor's Conference on Appalachian Development was called by Gov. Moore because, the Governor said, "It is the people who are responsible for the recent surge of progress. . . It is the people of Western North Carolina who must see that the impetus for improvement is not lost, that the progress which benefits all people continues and accelerates in the months and years ahead."

In words to impress the need of expanded private enterprise upon the men and women invited to attend the conference, Gov. Moore said that extended school facilities are worth little unless good jobs are available for those who take advantage of the educational opportunities, and that access roads are important to more people when they lead to better jobs.

In ending his address, the Governor said that "Western North Carolina will become in the future what you would have it become."

Dan E. Stewart, Director N.
C. Department of Concervation
and Development, praised the
high type of labor found in this
part of the state. He also pointed out that within the past
ten years in this region of North Carolina 302 new industries
have been established, 619 have
expanded, with an investment
of more than \$800 million. These
industries, Stewart said, have
created new annual payrolls of
\$245 million.

Mr. Stewart stressed the point of the need for local governments and investors to develope water and sewer facilities, which are requirements for development and grow h of an area. He said that "the potential growth pattern is being speeded by State and Federal funds". Beyond this point, however, local governments and private investors must take over.
