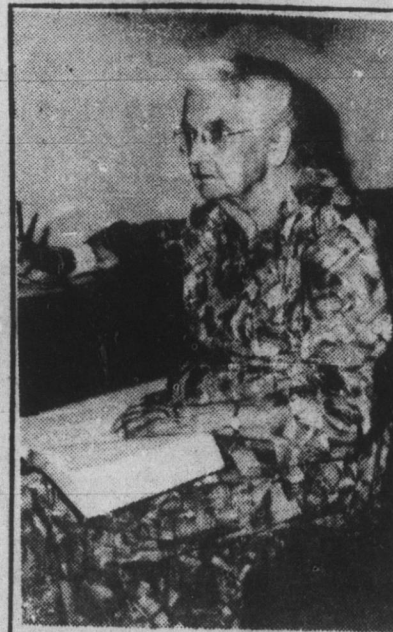

Oldest SBC Sunday School Teacher

A 97-year old adult teacher holds the longest record of Sunday School teaching in the Southern Baptist Convention. Mrs. Belle G. Roland, member of First Baptist Church, Tucumcari, New Mexico, has been teaching for 80 years. She began teaching in a summer "subscription school", in which Bible was a major part of curriculum, at the age of 15, and in Sunday School in Scott County, Virginia, at the age of 17. She taught for many years in Burnsville, N. C., where her husband, G. G. Roland, served as deacon in First Baptist Church.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Gold, Mrs. Roland was born Dec. 12, 1870, and was graduated with honors from college in 1892. Daniel Boone of Burnsville is her nephew.

Since moving to New Mexico in 1921, she has taught adult classes, having taught the T. E. L. Class of First Baptist Church, Tucumcari, for more than 13 years.



Miss Anglin To Attend Conference

Miss Anita Anglin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Anglin of Burnsville, is one of 640 Girl Scouts selected from throughout the nation this summer to attend the World of Arts Conference at Edith Macy Training Center in Pleasantville, New York.

The World of Arts Conference was designed by the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. to enable some of its members to explore the arts in a series of 4 workshops with 159 girls attending each session.

Miss Anglin is presently attending a ten-day "Folk Arty of the Fifty States" session which has as its focus the American handicrafts and arts that have come down through the generations and survive to the present day. The girls at this workshop will not only learn from experts in this wide field, but also from each other as they share information about their respective areas through conversation and demonstrations.

Miss Anglin is a member of the Senior Girl Scout Troop in Burnsville and her trip as well as those of three other WNC girls was sponsored by the Pisgah Girl Scout Council. On her return, Miss Anglin will share her new knowledge with other Girl Scouts in this area, for one of the prime purposes of the conference is to stimulate an interest in the arts on the part of Girl Scouts and others in the community.
