Orthopedic Clinics Held At **Health Center**

An Orthopedic Clinic for the physically handicapped is held in the Yancey County Health Center in Burnsville four times annually. An Orthopedist is provided by the Crippled Children's Section of the North Carolina State Board of Health, Other State Board of Health personnel such as physical therapists, nutritionists and consultants assist the local public health nurse with these clinics. However, funds for certain other expenses involved have to be obtained from local sources in order to make the clinics possible.

When this clinic was first organized as a function of the Health Department in this county in 1959, the officers of the Yancey County United Fund agreed to sponsor this clinic and underwrite its local cost.
