Larry McIntosh Honored By Men's Club

Larry McIntosh was honored by the Burnsville Men's Club Monday night at a supper meeting at the Burnsville Community Building. Roy Ray, member of the club, presented Larry with \$100.00 on behalf of the club to be used to further his education.

Larry was honored due to his outstanding military record during the last three years. During that time he was presented the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force. McIntosh distinguished himself while serving as a team member of a 25th. Infantry Division long range reconnaissance patrol performing a reconnaissance mission in Viet Cong infested jungle the third and fourth of February, 1967. The reconnaissance efforts of the patrol provided valuable intelligence information about an area known to certain large numbers of Viet Cong. Specialist McIntosh was the first team member to site a large Viet Cong base camp and supply

cache. He uncovered numerous booby traps that presented a danger to his trailing team members. His alertness during the operation enabled the team to avoid detection by the Viet Cong until their mission was complete. His actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflected a great credit upon himself, the 4th. United States Cavalry, the 25th. Infantry Division and the United States Army.

Larry is the son of Mr. Delzie McIntosh of Burnsville and Mrs. Helen Warren of Escandide, Calif. He is a 1964 graduate of East Yancey High School and enlisted in the Army in August, 1965. He was a member of the Special Forces Training Group, Fort Bragg. He arrived overseas in August 1966. He is out of the military service now and is working in Asheville where he and his wife make their home. He married Miss Ruth McCurry, daughter of Mr. and
