He said this is the same method of financing which has been used to build the existing 469m le parkway. It is now virtually completed.

Taylor said, "Except for the Appalachian' Road Building Program, this is the most important legislation for the economy of Western North Carolina thet has been approved since I became a Member of Congress. It should bring millions of additional visitors into our, mountain area and should be of service to people all over America."
