Appointment Of WNC Legislators To House And Senate Rules

House Speaker Earl Vaughn and Lt. Gov. Pat Taylor, Jr., at a joint news conference, announced the appointment of five Wes'ern North Carolina legislators to the House and Senate Rules Committee for the 1969 General Assembly, which begins Jan. 15. They are Sen. R. T. (Ted) Dent of Asheville, a Republican; Sen. Clyde M. Norton of Old Fort, a Democ-at; Rep. Herschel S. Harkins of Asheville, a Democrat; Rep. James E. Holhouser, Jr., of Boone, a Republican; and Rep. Liston B. Ramsey of Marshall, a Democrat. Ramsey and Holhouser were named as Vice-Chairmen of the House Committee. Holhouser is chmn, of the State Republican party. Sen. Dent was named as one of the two chairmen of the Senate Committee.

Vaughn stated that he hoped work could befin immmediately. "So as to have a tentative draft of the House rules ready upon the convening of the General Assembly." Vaughn also stated "Although traditionally the majority party organized the General Assembly and holds all po-

sitions of leadership," he was appointing four Republicans to the House Committee. He was doing this, he said "Out of a sense of fairness and in the hope that it could lead to closer cooperation between the parties and make for a smoother and more efficient session."

Washington: Congressman Roy A. Taylor Thursday announced the approval of a grant of \$60,894 from the Appalachian Regional Committee to extend public library facilities at Spruce Pine.

The book capacity of the enlarged facility will be increased from 8000 to 30,000 volumes and will serve Mitchell, Avery and Yancey Counties. Construction work will cost a total of \$161,-070. A total \$67,962 will be provided through the Library Services and Construction Act: \$32,214 from local sources and the \$60,894 from the Appalachian Regional Committee.
