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
WKYK Radio **Station Gets** New Owner

Under Dr. Von Braun's direction, the Marshall Space Flight Center group has "firsts" in space, including the first nose cone of a ballistic missile to reenter the atmosphere from space; first primate to journey into space (monkeys Ab'e and Baker': and the launching of Explorer I, the first U. S. earth satelite.

Advertisers Help Keep **Newspapers Independent**

Political and economic independence are inseparable. No better illustration of this fact can be found than in the operation of that mainstay of liberty, the free press. To be free the press must be self-supporting.

The practical side of press freedom was described by the advertising director of a major metropolitan newspaper: "While the First Amendment (to the U. S. Constitution) guarantees freedom of the press, it is the strength provided by advertising revenues that makes it possible. No subsidized press can hope to be objective and unbiased in news treatment or editorial policy. . . I believe that America's newspapers . . . Ly advertising's vigor-imparting revenues, are the most objective, the most iinformative, and the most reliable newspapers in the world."

The oft heard statement that private enterprise and a free press will live or die together is no exaggeration. Neither is it an exaggeration to point out that representative government and

liberty itself will stand or fall with private enterprise and a free press. And so we should be thankful for the advertising horsepower that keeps a good newspaper solvent.
