

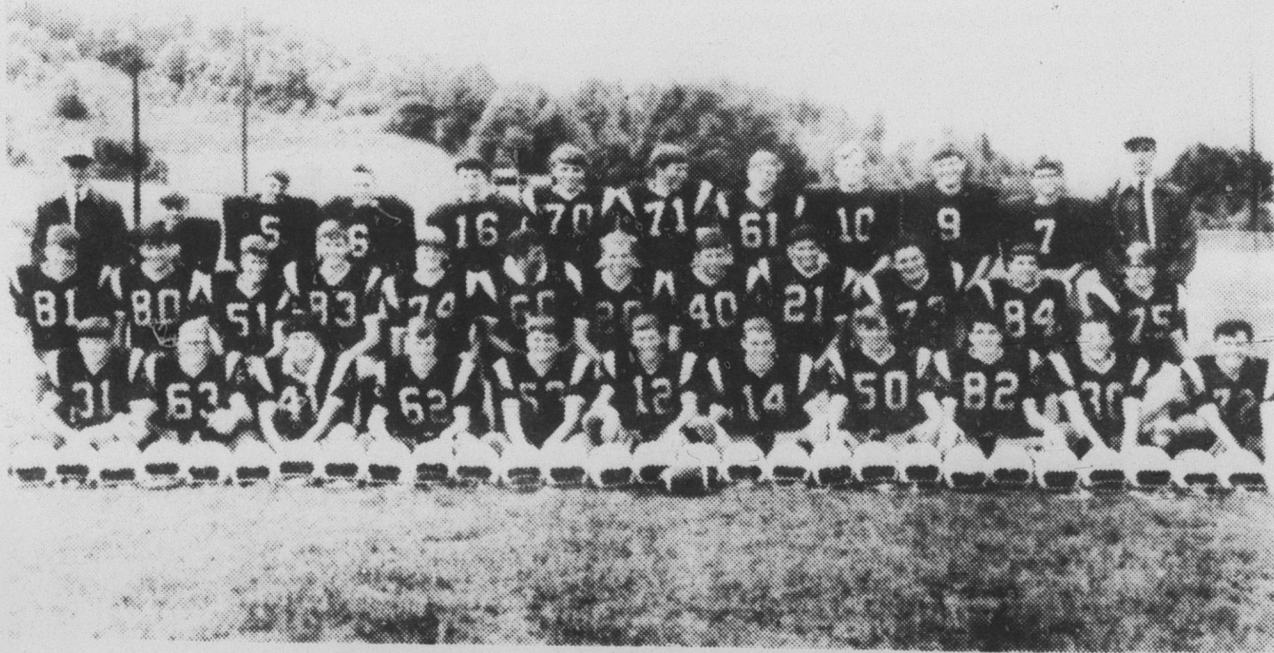

Comprehensive Occupational Education Program Instituted At Yancey Schools

Mr. Larry Howell has been appointed and accepted the position of Comprehensive Occupational Education Coordinator for Yancey County Schools, according to Landrum Wilson, Superintendent.

The Comprehensive program has been made available since school began this year. It comes under a coop program of Occupational Education. The school, business and industry cooperate in providing a laboratory for on the job training of the students. Mr. Howell's experience as a teacher and guidance counselor makes him highly and uniquely qualified for this position. Mr. Wilson said that we are fortunate to obtain his service.

Students at Cane River and East Yancey will be able to participate in this program.

According to Mr. Howell: Comprehensive Occupational Education is a joint effort of schools and employers in business and industry to provide on-the-job training for high school juniors and seniors in occupational areas of their choice. It provides supervised occupational experiences enabling student-learners to acquire skills and to gain understanding of their chosen careers.

Employers furnish on-the-job training to students under actual working conditions.

The students enrolled in the COE program will have one class period per day devoted to Comprehensive Occupational Educational Training in addition to their regular school classes. In this COE class the students will be exposed to two areas of instruction: General related instruction includes those areas of instruction which have common relationships to all qualifying occupations.

Technical related instruction

includes those phases of any given qualifying occupation which the student-learner must master in order to properly perform within the occupations.

The COE program serves:

The students to bridge the gap between high school preparation and the skills and understanding they need in work assignments and to respect the values of work and productiveness in our economy. It holds energetic young people in school because it gives them an opportunity to learn and earn while completing their high school education. It improves the quality of school work for the average student because it increases their understanding of the practical reasons for completing their high school education while obtaining vocational training.

The employers by providing the opportunity to assist in developing future employees and to use the service of the coordinator in planning and conducting a training program for the student-learner.

The community by having young citizens better adapted to responsibilities of earning a living and assuming an adult place in the economy and society, with capabilities for greater contributions to the community.

The schools by providing a chosen contact with everyday life of the community and with the job requirements of business and industry for students graduating from high school.

Rebels vs Panthers Is Big Game Of Season

East Yancey High School Panthers will play host to the Cane River High School Rebels this Friday, September 5th. The kick-off is scheduled for 8:00 p. m. at East Yancey field. The schools are great rivals and there is a lot at stake in the game.

Last year the Cane River Rebels won by a score of 52 to 13. The Panthers will be out Friday night to avenge last year's defeat.

Each team has played only 1 game this season. The Panthers were defeated at Mars Hill last Friday night and the Rebels and Marshall played to a tie at the Cane River field. Both teams will be looking for their first victory of the season.

Both teams are young and inexperienced with many sophomores and juniors in the line-up. The teams should be fairly evenly matched and a close game is

expected.

This is the first home game for the Panthers this season. An added attraction at the Panthers home games this season will be a new program which will sell for .25¢. This is the first year that East Yancey will have programs for sale at all home games. The program will consist of 32 pages containing rosters for both teams, pictures of the Panthers and Coaches, articles of interest, advertisements and a game summary and highlights.

Driverless Truck Rolls Down Main Street Causing Havoc And Damage In Its Wake

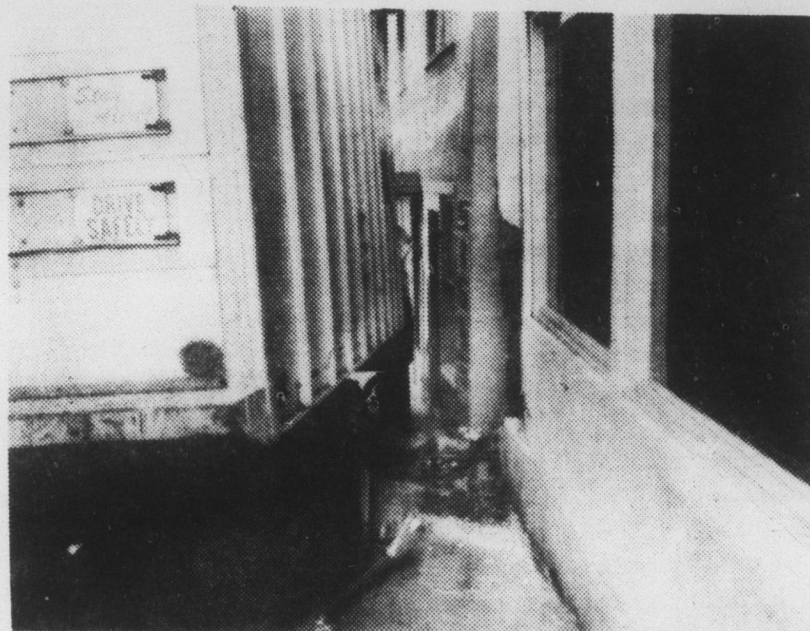
A multiple-collision accident took place yesterday when the emergency brake apparently failed on a Frederickson Motor Express truck from Charlotte, N. C.

At 11:30 a. m. on September 3, truck driver Vernice Atkins of Route 1, Nebo, N. C., parked the large vehicle in front of Polard's Drug Store to unload their freight. According to Burnsville policeman, Jim Chandler, the emergency brake apparently slipped while the cab was unoccupied and the truck rolled forward, creating havoc with parked cars in its path.

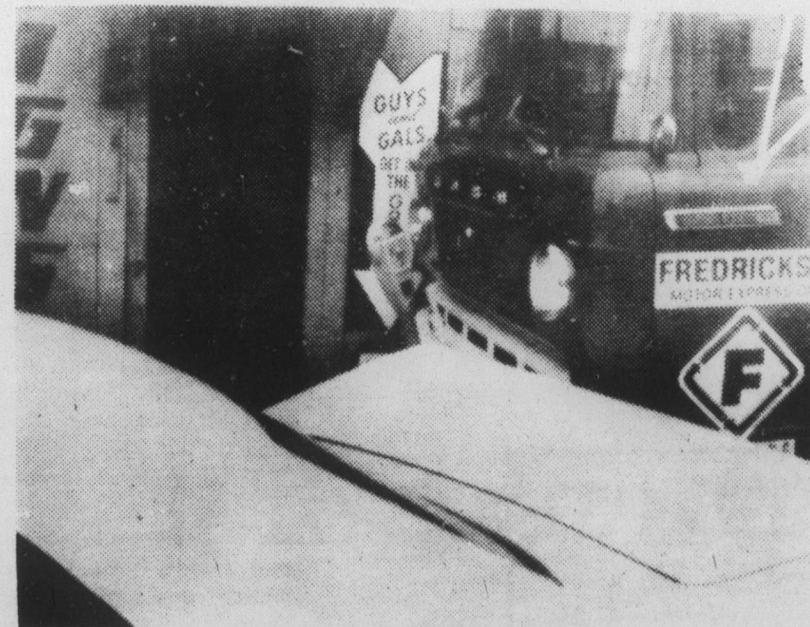
The first car hit by the truck belonged to Ruby Banks Clayton. It was parked in front of the Bank's Building. The truck then smacked into another parked car belonging to Grace Robinson Honeycutt of Burnsville, causing it to hit car number 3, owned by Sylva Hughes Allen of Burnsville. The truck was stopped in its journey by coming to rest against car number 2 and the Bank's Building, which sustained considerable damage to one corner.

Damage was the greatest to Mrs. Honeycutt's car, being estimated at \$750.00. The Allen car and the Clayton car were also damaged to a lesser extent, along with the Bank's Building.

No charges were filed by the Police Department.
