Highway 19 To Be Improved

The State Highway Commission will call for bids to improve US Highway 19 between Burnsville and Cane

Area Highway Commis - sioner Novile C. Hawkins and Representatives Liston Ramsey and Ernest Messer issued the joint announcement after conferring in Raleigh with State Highway Chairman Mr. Lauch Faircloth.

After the bids are opened in February, the contracts can be signed in March and work on the project, which will cost about one million dollars, can be started. Hawkins said that the present Highway Commission will allocate funds from the additional gasoline tax voted by the last General Assembly to pay for the Yancey County Project.
