More than 19, 300 telephones will be served by 14 exchanges in a new district of the Western Carolina Telephone Company and the Westco Telephone Company which will have its headquarters in Weaverville, North Carolina, it was announced by James Armstrong, President of the two companies.

The new district began opentions February 1, 1970 and will be headed by Mr. C. O. Stafford Jr. as Vice President and Eas tern District Plant Operations Manager. Mr. C. R. Allenwill be Eastern District Commercial Manager. The new service area will include the counties of Buncombe, Madison, Mitchell,

Yancey, McDowell and Davie Counties.

"This change," Mr. Armstrong said, "is being implemen ted to provide improved custo mer service in the Eastern part of our eleven county service area in North Carolina."

Mr. Stafford's responsibilities will be the overall supervision of plant construction, installa tions of customer services and maintenance.

Mr. Allen is to have under his supervision all commercial functions of the business including the handling of requests for service, billing and collections, and the compilation of custo mer directories.

several major service improvement programs to be completed this year.

In 1969 Eubanks said the company spent approximate ly \$526,000.00 for new outside cable plant and facilities to provide telephones in previously unserved areas, to provide additional facilities for a higher grade of service, and to improve the quality and reliability of service for existing custo mers. The large projects included in this overall program included new facilities for the Prices Creek, Jacks Creek, Pensacola, Red Hill, Tipton Hill and White Oak areas.

Mr. Eubanks also stated that the company's plans for new outside plant construction in 1970 called for an expenditure of approximately \$142,000.00 in new facilities. An additional \$172,000.00 was spent during 1969 for a central office build ing addition in Bakersville, additional local switching equip-




and new improved long distance facilities from Burnsville and Micaville.

The company's plans for 1970, according to Eubanks, include additional central office switching equipment for all three exchanges to provide for new customers and the upgrading of service for existing custo mers. A new long distance cable carrier system will be installed to serve Bakersville cus tomers. A new addition to the Burnsville central office building is nearing completion at this time. The total cost of the cen-

tral office switching and long distance improvements during 1970 will total approximately \$318,000.00.

Mr. Eubanks said, "The Westco Telephone Company has invested a tremendous quantity of time and money in an effort to catch up, and keep pace with the rapidly expanding demand for new and improved service. We are continuing our efforts with all possible speed to fulfill our committment of providing high quality telephone service to every citizen (customer) in our service area."
