their campus, were the next to stop.

"I had been in the water for about 15 minutes when they came along," said Livengood. "It was so cold our hands froze to the bumper and back window of the car as we tried to raise it. Then when we got the car up, it tried to float away. And then when we got the guy out, he was so cold and stiff he couldn't stand up and he almost floated away, too," he added.

Livengood estimated that the rescue operation took about 45 minutes. Drenched, with their clothes freezing on them, the three men, with their almost incapacitated accident victims scrambled into their cars and sped toward the Swain County Hospital in Bryson City.

Dr. William E. Mitchell, on call at the emergency room, said "I don't believe I ever saw anybody colder." Dowling and Baskette, students at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, and Schlegel, who was visiting them, probably would have frozen to death if help had not arrived, Mitchell said.

Thawed and dried by heaters at the hospital, and aided by a cup of hot coffee, Livengood went on to Asheville, arriving a little later than he had expected.

And Baskette, who was soaking up to his neck through the whole ordeal, never even got a bad cold out of it.
