Mountains Season Underway

Plans for the 2nd season of Music In The Mountains have recently been completed and once again musicians and music lovers from far and near will come to Burnsville for the Sunday Concerts which were so applauded during the 1st season last year.

The first program, a Flute and Harpsichord Concert, will be held June 27 at 4:00 p.m. in the Presbyterian Church in Burnsville.

Again this year, a special Outdoor Guitar and Song Concert will be held July 4th on the Town Square in Burnsville.

A much appreciated feature of last year's Music In The Mountains, it is hoped that all Yancey Countians and visitors to this area will include this program in their Independence Day celebration.

At the Outdoor Concert,ticket sales will not be feasible (an offering will be asked to help defray expenses) but at the other concerts, an admission charge of \$1.00 (students 50¢) will be asked. Tickets will be available at the Nu Wray Inn and Yancey County Country Store--not at the church where the concert will be held.

With the exception of the first concert at the Presbyter ian Church and the July 4th concert on the Town Square, all concerts will be held in the First Baptist Church, Burnsville, at 4:00 p. m. on Sundays. Classes Held

Workshops for Music In The Mountain will be held this year at Mars Hill College because of lack of facilities in Burnsville. However, it is hoped that the entire program can be moved to Burnsville in the near future when adequate arrangements can be made.

At the workshops, a faculty of 13 professional musicians will teach piano, harpsichord, organ, violin, viola, cello, flute, oboe, clarinet, French horn, guitar, lute, recorder,

and composition. Students are currently enrolling. A few scholarships have been made available. Students and amateur musicians will give recitals, and students and faculty will play together as a chamber ensemble. Both recitals and rehearsals will be open to the public without charge.

For the year 1971 funds are needed to cover minimum faculty salaries, music, maintenance and transportation of instruments, rental of practice and rehearsal rooms, scholar ships, publicity, etc. A national foundation will provide half of the expenses, but require that local efforts match this grant. A number of people are contributing their services but the balance of \$3,750 must be raised in cash from individual contributions, student fees, and concerts. All gifts are tax-deductible.
