Yancey Dairy Farmers Honored In June

June is a special time to honor our dairy farmers who contribute so much to our local economy and to our nutrition and eating pleasure. Yancey County has 35 grade A dairies who ship milk to three companies and Yancey County milk makes its way into milk cartons, ice cream, butter, cheese, and many other tasty foods.

In spite of inflation, milk is still your best buy at the supermarket. In fact, the real price of milk and dairy products has been declining steadily for 20 years. The real price is what a man can buy with an hour's labor. Statistics show that the average manufacturing wage continues to far out-

would buy the same amount.

At these prices, milk and dairy food equivalents are truly your best food buy. Milk contains more than 100 different food elements. A single quart supplies 82 percent of an adult's daily requirements of calcium, 83 percent of riboflavin, 63 percent of the phosphorus, 40 percent of the protein, 30 percent of the vitamin A, 21 percent of the calories, and significant amounts of other nutrients. For even greater value, you can buy these same nutrients in dry form for only 13 cents a pound, strip dairy price increases to the consumer.

The real prices of butter and milk are half of the 1940 real prices. Cheese is down

25 percent. In 1940 it took 21 minutes of labor to buy a half gallon of milk. In 1968 you could buy the same half gallon of milk with only 10.7 minutes of work. A pound of butter "cost" 32.7 minutes of work in 1940. In 1968 16.7 minutes of labor would buy the same amount of butter.

In 1940 a man would have to work 23.5 minutes to buy a pound of cheese. In 1968 only 17.7 minutes of labor
