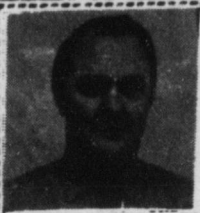

Ranger Column

Labor Day Weekend I had the pleasure of horseback riding along the crest of the Black Mountain with several members of the Mount Mitchell Bridle and Saddle Club. We began at Adrian Simmons farm on the Colberts Creek Road and climbed to the old railroad grade on Maple Camp Bald (elevation 5800 ft.) From here we had a breath-taking view of the Toe River Valley with Roan Mountain lying in the North. The bald was covered with ripe blackberries and huckleberries ready for the picking. After a short break here and a feast on wild berries, we rode on around the old railroad grade towards Camp Alice, our destination for the night. This portion of the trail skirted the rugged Rock Creek drainage giving the rider a spectacular view of the surrounding valley. At some points there were cliffs dropping for several hundred feet.

When we arrived at Camp Alice, Lee Slagle was already preparing the evening meal. The smell of frying steak and perked coffee filled the mountain air. Lee had driven his pick-up in from Mount Mitchell State Park and had set up his kitchen at the Forest Service Camp shelter. After an evening of good food and the telling of tall tales around the campfire we settled down for the night.

The next morning we left for Buncombe Horse Range trail via the old railroad grade. There we would lose elevation rapidly to the South Toe River Road a distance of 8 miles. This portion of the trail affords the rider a splendid view of Mount Mitchell, Clingmans Peak and the Blue Ridge Mountains. The trail winds through spruce and fir forest at its higher elevations and then drops down along the North Toe River drainage through hardwood forest.

This Horse Trail was constructed this past summer with the help of the young boys working under the local Neighborhood Youth Corp. The trail is about 16 miles long and has some of the most spectacular high mountain views in East-

ern America. At Camp Alice, the mid way point, the Forest Service has a trail shelter, toilet facilities and a spring is near by. From Camp Alice there are foot trails to Mount Mitchell State Park and Black Mountain Campground. Mount Mitchell is the highest point in Eastern America (elev. 6684).

For anyone interested in riding the new horse trail it is suggested you contact our office for more detailed trail information. Some portions of the trail need additional work and signing. This could be confusing to persons not familiar with the area. Our plans are to have the trail fully completed by next summer.

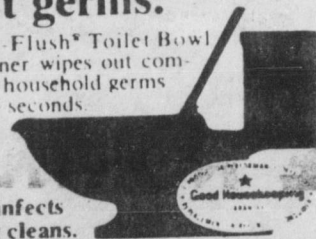
