

# Notice

All people in Mitchell County will be mailed an abstract to declare their tax for 1972. There will not be any tax listers appointed as in the past. This will be left to your own honor to give a true list. Every abstract has to be signed by the owner of the property. There can be no agent or any other person authorized to sign this abstract. There will be a place to list your motor vehicles, farm tractors and equipment. List the model and body style and make of each vehicle. Do not set a price on the vehicles; this will be priced out at the Tax Supervisor's office by the Red Book when abstract is returned. In listing the farm tractors, be sure to give the size; Model number; year and make of the tractor and equipment . In listing heavy trucks give the gross weight and cost of ag to determine the price of trucks. There are thousands of different size trucks set out in the Blue Book which your truck will be priced out. Therefore, if you do not give all the information needed we can not get a true list price from so many different makes.

The Machinery Act pertaining to taxation on all personal property has been changed in the last General Assembly, therefore the appraisal of all property comes under the State Assessment Board which is a part of the North Carolina Revenue Department.

TO EVERY BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENT IN MITCHELL COUNTY MERCHANTS, AUTOMOBILE DEALERS TIRE DEALERS, AUTO PARTS DEALERS, AND ALL ENTERPRISES WILL HAVE TO DECLARE FOR TAXATION THE SAME FIGURE THAT YOU WILL BE FILING WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND STATE DEPARTMENT OR REVENUE ON YOUR INVENTORIES. YOUR INVENTORIES WILL BE CHECKED WITH AGAINST YOUR RETURN WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE. IF YOU MAKE A FALSE STATEMENT WITH YOUR COUNTY TAX RETURN THERE WILL BE A HEAVY PENALTY IMPOSED UPON YOU. THIS IS THE LAW YOU WILL HAVE TO ABIDE BY. G.S. 105-108.

Duty to list: penalty for failure G.S. 105-108

Every person in whose name any property is to be listed under the term of this sub chapter shall list the property with the tax supervisor within the time allowed by law on an abstract setting forth the information required by this subchapter.

In addition to all other penalties prescribed by law, any person whose duty it is to list any property who wilfully fails or refuses to list the same within the time prescribed by law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not be exceed five hundred dollars (500.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months. The failure to list shall be prima facie evidence that the failure was wilful.

Any person who removes or conceals property for the purpose of evading taxation or who aids or abets the removal or concealment of property for the purpose of evading taxation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months.

There cannot be an extension of time granted to anyone for listing real or personal property beyond January 31, 1972.
