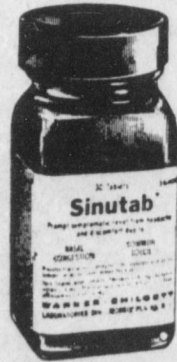
Mrs. George Craine was discharged Saturday evening from Burnsville hospital. Mrs. Craine had the virus.

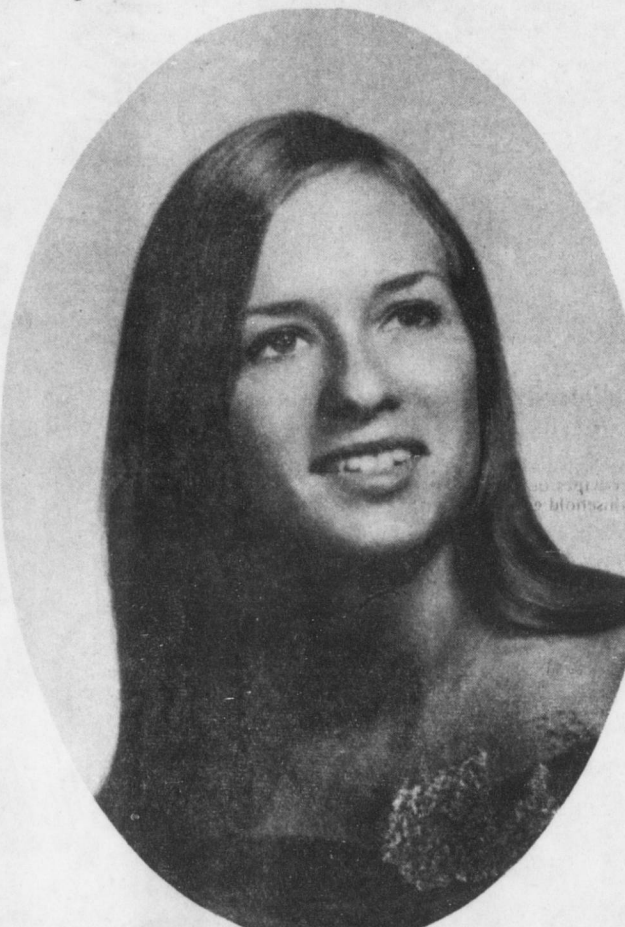
