

Social Security

Social Security District Manager, Mr. O. B. Cosby, Jr., said today that all social security beneficiaries who are on the benefit rolls in September will automatically receive a 20 percent increase. The increase is effective beginning with the payments for the month of September which will be received October 3.

The new law also includes a provision for automatic annual increases in Social Security benefits as the cost of living rises in the future.

Under the new law the maximum taxable amount of anmual earnings that is counted for benefit and contribution purposes will rise from the present \$9,000 a year to \$10,800 in 1973 and to \$12,000 in 1974. Thereafter, this amount will

be adjusted automatically to keep pace with rising wages. These additional earnings will count toward the benefits payable to workers and their families in the future.
