

Forester To Speak

Del W. Thorsen, supervisor Carolina, with headquarters in Asheville, will speak to the Sierra Club on Saturday, August 12, at 8:00 p. m., in the lecture hall of the Humanities Building at the University of North Carolina at Asheville. Robert J. Gillespie Jr., of Fairview, program chairman of the club, has announced that the public is invited.

Thorsen will talk on "Clearcutting and Wilderness. " His remarks are expected to apply particularly to the Pisgah and Nantahala national forests in Western North Carolina. Gillespie points out that "clear- cutting in national forests is one of the highly controversial issues of the times and is currently the subject of a bitter fight between conservationists and the lumber industry. It involves cutting down every tree of every age and stripping a given section of forest, as opposed to the selection-cut method of timber harvest by which only a few of the mature trees are removed and animal habitats, trails, campsites, water sources, spawning grounds, glens, etc., are usually not destroyed. "

The Sierra Club is the national organization of some 150,000 members with groups and chapters throughout the nation. It was founded by John Muir in California in 1892 for the purpose of helping people explore, enjoy, and protect parks, wilder ness, waters, forests and wild-
