MAY Tech Starts Year

Mayland Technical Institute began its first full year of operation on Tuesday, September 5, by registering 24 students in Auto Mechanics; 22 students in Business Administration; 14 students in Practical Nursing and 15 students in Secretarial Science. A total of 75 students from Mitchell, Yancey and Avery Counties were enrolled in four curriculums.

Classes are being held in the Ellis Building, Baker Building and old Presbyterian Church Building in Spruce Pine and on the Lees McRae College campus and Cannon Memorial Hospital in Banner Elk.

An orientation was held on Wednesday morning, September 6 in the sanctuary of the Cen-

tral Baptist Church in Spruce Pine. Mr. Maurice Gilliam, Pastor of Central Baptist Church gave an inspirational devotion centered around the importance and meaning of work. Mr. W.B. (Bill) Wilkins, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Mayland Technical Institute, welcomed the students and gave a brief history of the institution. Social Security Questions-Answers

Q. When I went to the hospital earlier this year, I had to pay \$68. They told me this was my deductible. I thought I met my deductible earlier when I had some doctor bills. Now I'm really confused. Can you tell me why I had to pay the deductible twice?

A. You didn't pay the deductible under each of the two parts of Medicare--for the hospital part the deductible is \$50 a year. You had met the hospital insurance deductible when you went into the hospital.

Q. I know I'll get an increase in my monthly social security payments, starting with the check delivered in October. But what happens if the cost of living goes up in the future? Social security is my only income.

A. The new social security law provides for automatic adjustments of benefits based on increases in the cost of living.

If the cost of living goes up 3 percent or more in one year, monthly social security payments will also go up starting the following January--unless a general benefit increase was enacted or became effective during the prior year. Cost of living increases will be measured by the Consumer Price Index put out by the U.S. Dept. of Labor.

Q. I hear that monthly social security benefits will be increased. I got the last raise automatically. Must I do anything to get this one?

A. You don't have to do anything to get the new 20 percent increase. You'll see the increase for the first time in the social security check you get in early October.

Q. My son was killed in Vietnam. Army paid the funeral bill, but there was some burial expenses which I paid. Will Social Security pay anything toward those expenses?

A. You should keep a record

of all additional expenses such as flowers, telephone calls, etc. Take the record to your nearest Social Security Office. Some, if not all of these additional expenses can probably be reimbursed.

Q. My husband became disabled last month. The doctor told him that he will not be able to return to work within the next twelve months. Is there some type of program set up by social security to pay disabled persons?

A. Yes. Social Security does have a disability program in order to become eligible for these benefits, however, the law states that a person's disability must be expected to last for at least 12 months or result in death.
