Winners of the pioneering elf help community improvenent program, first of its kind n North Carolina, will be announced at the annual awards uncheon of the Western North Carolina Development Associaion on December 1 at the Grove Park Inn in Asheville. A otal of 79 communities in 15 counties have participated in he program this year. Many other community clubs were acive but did not compete in the Purpose of the Community

Development Program, which is open to any organized community in the western counties, is to encourage people to work together to build better communities in which to live. For many years it has operated with a slogan "There is no limit to what a community can do--if it wants to. " Aim of the youth program is to encour-

age participation of young people in community organizations and activities, development of leadership to promote adult leadership and support of youth and recreation programs.

For coffee cake, mix and sift corn meal, flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk, egg and apples. Stir until thoroughly blended, Bake in greased 8-inch square baking pan at 350 degrees about 30 min. While coffee cake is baking, prepare topping: combine brown sugar flour and cinnamon! Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle on top of coffee cake. Bake an additional 10 min. Serve warm, cut
