It will be available in a wide variety of colors, both solid and multicolored. Handmade rugs can be washed in household machines or hosed off on the patio because they will not shrink, and the color, which is part and parcel of the fiber itself, cannot wash out. Elefant, the yarn trade mark, will be available in 2 ounce and 6 ounce spools and is considerably less expensive than its counterpart, wool. The value is high because of low cost, speed of workmanship, and easy-care qualities of the end product.

A June wedding is planned.



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


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
