The Rev. Haglers returned recently and brought three Florida granddaughters with them for an extended stay.

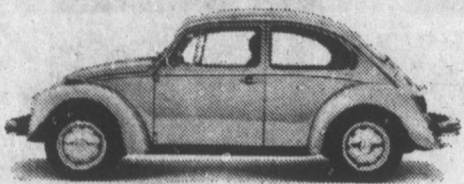
We'll see you at the Community House July 4--and the Bingo games will start the following week on Wednesday night at 7:30. Come join us--we'll be looking for you.
